

Expect Maples to be Healthy for Ferndale

Injuries, Port Huron Too Much

Most of the injured players are expected to be in top form for the all-important Ferndale team that will invade Seaholm tomorrow night.

Maple Coach Carl Lemle is captain of George Forrest, Chuck Hartung and Phil Isbell, but Boyd Mayhew and Rod Ruddy are still on the doubtful list.

The return of the "big three" and a healthy Sam Reeve will give the Maples a fresh outlook on the game of football—and should make them at least an even choice with Ferndale.

SCOUTING REPORTS on the surprising Ferndale team show that quarterback Mike Brown is the big gun of the attack along with a quick-hitting and fast-moving line.

Ferndale also has two fleet halfbacks that need only one break to go all the way. Both have been clocked under 10 seconds in the 100-yard dash.

A rash of injuries, some had breaks and an aroused Port Huron team proved to be too much for the one-ranked Maples.

Port Huron stopped Seaholm's winning streak at three straight, 25-10, and threw the league race wide open. Port Huron, however, is not expected to remain unbeaten very long.

FERNDALE IS the team to catch and a victory would mean a virtual championship for the Eagle eleven.

Sam Reeve started the scoring for Seaholm when he plunged nine yards in the first, but Fred Thornton tied it up with an 85-yard jaunt up the middle of the vaulted Seaholm line.

George Forrest hit Steve Jacobson for a 21-yard scoring play, but a recovered fumble and a 27-yard aerial from Gary Laughlin to Tom Redmond tied it up again.

SEAHOLM HAD nine first downs in the first half, Port Huron had none, but the scoring was tied at halftime, 12-12.

The Laughlin to Redmond combination clicked again, this time for 32 yards to put the Big Reds in front and Thornton prolonged three yards to ice the decision.

Forrest hit Harry Holden on a 28-yard run for six minutes left. An inside kick was recovered, but Forrest was smothered before he could lose a game six minutes as Port Huron shot the gap with two men.

Seaholm Harriers Host EML

Seaholm high's cross country team will lay its Eastern Michigan League title on the line this afternoon when it hosts six other loop teams at 3:15 p.m.

Maple harriers will be seeking their sixth straight crown, but one particular target will be Hazel Park.

The Packers defeated the Maples in a recent dual meet and it was the first dual race loss in six years by an EML opponent.

ONLY KIMBALL will not be represented at the meet since both Royal Oak schools dropped the sport in an economy move.

On Oct. 25, the Maples will visit an old foe, Redford, the Detroit City League champion and will then travel to the Albion Invitational on Saturday.

On consecutive Saturdays following the Albion Invitational, Seaholm will defend its regional title and then enter the state meet to be held at Ypsilanti.

Gun Safety Will Help Cut Toll

LANSING, Oct. 15—Approximately 20 hunters who go afield this fall will not be around to enjoy Michigan's 1960 seasons. Another 200 or more hunters will be wounded by hunters.

These figures are estimates based on past hunting accident records. They need not and should not hold true.

LAST YEAR, 23 persons were killed and 246 wounded by firearms during Michigan's deer and small game seasons.

Conservation Department officials stress that the greatest means to hunt life and limb is the victim's own gun or that of a hunting companion.

More correctly, it isn't the caliber of the weapon, the type of bullet used or the game target hunted that poses the major threat, it's the guy behind the gun.

Careless gun handling claimed 11 lives and wounded 79. Stray bullets and hunter firing errors killed three and injured 97.

Other accidents were caused by careless fence or log crossing, careless loading and unloading, tripping and falling, defective weapons and loaded weapons in cars, boats and tractors.

The Seaholm-Port Huron football game held last Friday night in the riverside city will probably go down in local grid history as the most fantastic one ever seen.

In the first place, it was a game that Seaholm should have won.

In the second place, the Maples had no business being as good—and as bad—as they were.

SEAHOLM WAS NOT expected to give the Big Reds much of a contest since five first-string players were out with injuries and two others were operating at 50 per cent efficiency.

For the uninformed, Phil Isbell, John Sisson, Boyd Mayhew, Chuck Hartung and Rod Ruddy didn't see any action. They would have been killed if they tried.

Quarterback George Forrest hobbled around on a stiff ankle and fullback Sam Reeve played it out on a bum knee. Now comes the game.

SEAHOLM PUSHED Port Huron all over the lot, scored a few touchdowns, but let the Big Reds score one more.

The Maples had racked up nine first downs in the first half and scored twice. Port Huron didn't make a first down and also scored twice.

Interesting, eh what?

For those interested in details, a youngster went 85 yards straight up the middle for one of those TD's and a recovered fumble and 27-yard pass play accounted for the other.

PORT HURON recovered four of Seaholm's seven fumbles, all told, and racked up four first downs in the second half while scoring two more markers.

Seaholm, on the other hand, made eight first downs in the second period and if it hadn't been for a 28-yard pass play from Forrest to Harry Holden, the Maples probably still wouldn't have scored.

If not, try a few of these.

Port Huron had only four first downs, but out-rushed the Maples, 160-126.

YET SEAHOLM out-passed the Big Reds, 123-83.

There were no pass interceptions, but Seaholm completed 8 of 17 (which is a good average for high school play) but Port Huron completed four of five aeriels, two of them for touchdowns.

Even the pro teams would like to sport that record.

Of course, the record books won't show the intangible factors that influenced the game, but 20 years from now, Seaholm high grads will be telling their boys "... I remember when ..."

And 20 years from now, that game will still sound as fantastic as it is today.

Yellowjackets Visit Clintondale Saturday

The Jackets tallied first when Mike Kramer hit his favorite target, Jerry Jaffe, with a 37-yard pass.

Clisno tied it up on a one-yard plunge in the second.

HE BROKE the ball game up by catching a 25-yard pass from Richard Eaton.

Jaffe closed the gap on a 31-yard option play, but Jim Newell made a 75-yard kickoff return and Norm Semple finished it off with a 34-yard scoring run.

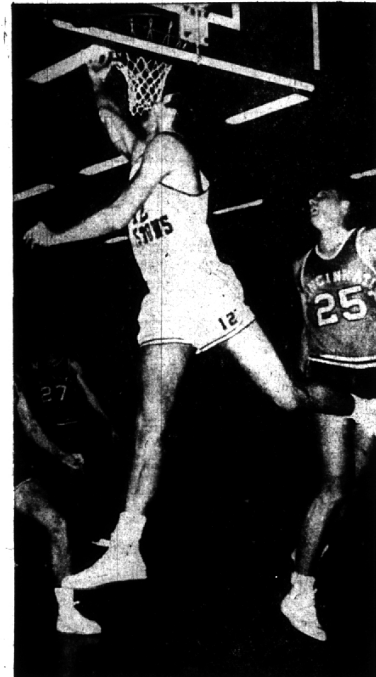
The Yellowjackets had other opportunities to score, but a fumble on the 20-yard line and an intercepted pass killed both chances.
