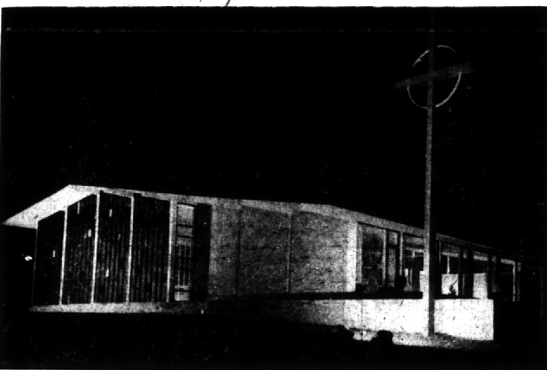

The striking new \$150,000 contemporary structure at West Maple and Middlebelt has warranted many an admiring glance. But, it will be the center of attention for a whole week, Nov. 1-5, when the Lutheran Church of the Shepherd King celebrates at formal dedication and installation services.

The initial service of dedication will be at 10:30 a.m. Nov. 1 with the opening of the doors and a procession of the congregation into the church. Speaker for the occasion will be the Rev. Arthur A. Foss, executive secretary of the English district, Lutheran church, Missouri synod.

IN AN AFTERNOON service at 4 p.m., furnishings given to the congregation's book of memorials will be consecrated with the Rev. Hugo G. Kleiner, president of the English district, and chairman of the Missouri synod's board for higher education, as the speaker. The Rev. A. Karl Boehmke, who has served as pastor since the mission began, will be installed as the church's first permanent pastor at 7 p.m. Nov. 2 with Rev. Kleiner

conducting the rite of installation. He will be assisted by clergymen from neighboring Lutheran churches.

AN 11-RANK FOUNDER pipe organ will be dedicated Nov. 3 with a sacred recital played by William Efrig. The organ was given to the church by Mr. and Mrs. Howard Krupsky in memory of Otto and Hilda Anderson.

A youth and Christian education service will be held the evening of Nov. 4 with Rev. Kleiner preaching for the young people. The Youth League will present a drama on the reformation theme.

THE FINAL SERVICE of dedication and personal consecration will be Nov. 5, stressing the theme

of Thanksgiving and paying special recognition to the church council, the women's league, guilds and new members of the congregation.
