

Seaholm Visits Mt. Clemens Friday Night

That game-winning field goal kicked by Ferdale in the last three minutes of the game Friday was an illegal play, according to athletic department films released Tuesday.

There were five men in the backfield and only six on the line. Many of the fans noticed it at the time and were hollering about it, but the play escaped both coaching staffs and the officials.

Seaholm High Coach Carl Lemle said that the school would not protest the game.

With their hopes for an Eastern Michigan League title all but gone, Seaholm's Maples will invade Mt. Clemens tomorrow night in hopes

of getting back into the win column.

The Bathers have a new coach and a new look this season as is evidenced by last week's win over Port Huron, 7-6. Port Huron is the same team that downed Seaholm two weeks ago, 25-19.

Ferdale, which defeated the Maples last week, 10-7, on a last-minute field goal, is undefeated this year and leads the league with a 3-0 record.

SEAHOLM'S only hope is for Ferdale to lose two games while the Maples win the rest of theirs.

The chances for such a thing happening are slim.

Coach Carl Lemle closed the locker room for 20 minutes after

the game, but the players were not "chewed out" as the saying goes.

LEMLE WAS proud of the team's showing and told the players that in the after-game session.

Seaholm took the opening kickoff and moved steadily toward Ferdale's goal when the ball was fumbled on the 25. Ed Gerson Fox picked up the loose ball and went the distance for the TD and Ferdale had a seven point lead.

The Maples kept coming back, but a fumble or a penalty stalled the drive and prevented them from scoring.

Seaholm took over the ball on its own 40 early in the fourth period and took the ball to the 19 in four plays and a penalty.

CHUCK HARTUNG smashed it over from the one three plays later and Phil Iabell tied the game with his PAT kick.

Ferdale stormed back and moved steadily until it was fourth and seven to go.

FOX stepped back and booted a 25-yard field goal with 3:27 left.

SEAHOLM took the kickoff and started moving again, but a fumble on the 50-yard line killed that drive and Ferdale ran out the clock.

Halfbacks Rod Ruddy and Steve Jacobson were injured in the second and third periods respectively, and may be out for the rest of the season.

Jim Stephenson took over at quarterback and George Korrest moved in a half to fill out the backfield.

SEAHOLM HAD the edge in practically everything but the scoring.

The Maples had 11 first downs to Ferdale's eight and outrushed the Raiders, 162-42. They also intercepted two Ferdale passes and recovered three fumbles while losing three.

Part of the story is reflected in the three yards lost on pass plays. Although the Maples completed eight of 14 passes, many of the plays were thrown for no gain.

Seaholm still came out on top in total offense, however, as it had 159 to Ferdale's 71.

When Hazei Park snapped Seaholm high's cross country win streak several weeks ago, Coach Kermit Ambrose refused to be worried.

At the time, he didn't say that four of his runners finished out of action with various leg ailments. All he said was that the team would "get them" at the Eastern Michigan League meet.

THAT MEET was held last week and the Maples chalked up their seventh consecutive league crown by crushing their nearest opponent, Hazel Park, 22-88.

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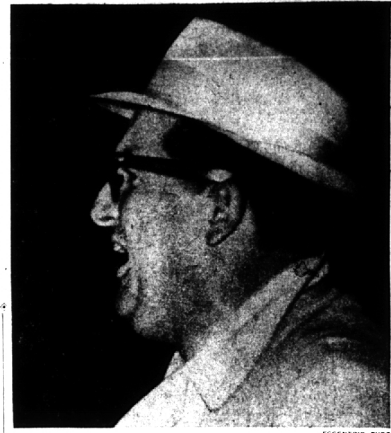
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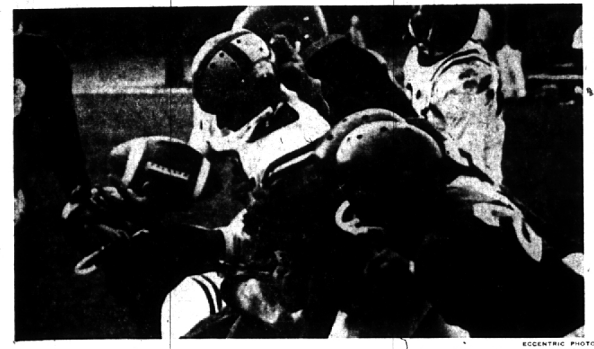

FOR THE SECOND week in a row, the Maples pushed their opponents all over the field, but couldn't win the game.

How long has it been since a high school team has won on a field goal—let alone a field goal that goes 35 yards? Ferdale's Gerson Fox booted one with three minutes left in the game to down the Maples, 10-7.

The last time Ferdale tried a field goal was 12 years ago. Two weeks ago, Seaholm did everything but beat Port Huron in losing, 25-19.

THE MAPLES HAD 17 first downs to Port Huron's four and out-passed the Big Reds, 123-83.

Against Ferdale, Seaholm had 11 first downs to the Raiders' eight, outrushed them 162-42 and had a total offense of 159 to 71 yards gained.

Seaholm lost four fumbles, but recovered three Ferdale bobbles while intercepting two passes.

At the beginning of the season, it was the Maples' vaunted depth that made them early favorites.

IN ONE GAME, the local squad lost the services of seven players and then a crop of injuries came up against Port Huron.

No matter how much depth a team has, it can stand only so many injuries.

Although this does not ease that disappointment for any of the players, students or fans, it just wasn't in the books for the Maples to win the title.

They were not a "team of destiny."
