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Presbyterians to Celebrate Church's 125th Anniversary

First Presbyterians will see the history of the church colorfully portrayed at 7:30 p.m. Nov. 8 when "Our Living Church, Past, Present and Future" is given to commemorate the 125th anniversary.

More than 125 persons will participate in the symphonic pageant's narration, pantomime, drama, song and dance with the Calvin high school choir blending voices for the program.

A character symbolizing Faith will be portrayed by Sue McClain to carry out the central theme.

THE CHURCH of the past will be seen through the disciples of Christ and the church fathers including Paul, Luther, John Calvin and others. With a Pilgrim girl, portrayed by Nancy Turner, the faith that founders brought America will unfold showing the missionary spirit invading Michigan.

THE REV. JOHN Monteith, the first Presbyterian minister in the Detroit area will be seen with the Indians at the same time Horatio Ball, an early surveyor is outlining Oakland county. The Marquette Indian dancers will perform at that time.

With a small trail laid out from Detroit to Birmingham, the early settlers of the town, the Hunters, the Hamiltons and the Willets will be seen tracing the journey to their new home coming from New York in 1816.

New Unitarian Minister to Start Pastorate Here

Lester Mondale, who was elected minister of the Birmingham Unitarian church at a special meeting last July, will begin his pastorate here Nov. 1.

Guest speakers have occupied the Birmingham pulpit since the death of Walter B. Pedersen last May. Mr. Mondale is a graduate of Hamilton university and the Harvard divinity school. He is the author of several books on liberal religion and he has served as minister of Unitarian churches in Hingham, Mass., Evanston, Ill. and Kansas City, Mo. He comes to Birmingham from Philadelphia, where he was connected with the Ethical Society.

It was made for her in 1946 by John Challis of Detroit, who can only produce 12 such instruments each year. Each time the 114-steel stringed harpsichord is moved, it must be tuned. The four musicians will perform in presentation of "The Creation" by Franz Joseph Haydn. Verbal soloists will be Ruth Killen, LaVerne Nancarrow and Amasa Tiffany.
