In announcing plans for these informal talks, discussions, and film presentations, Miss Jeanne Lloyd, Librarian, reported that among those who will share their experiences and impressions will be Mrs. Nadine Popluiko, instructor in Russian language at MSU-O; Dr. Marian Edmond of Wayne State university, Mrs. William McLaughy, Mrs. Robert Hat, Mrs. Russell Barnes, and Dr. George A. Roeper.

BOTH MRS. McLaughy and Mrs. Hat will show pictures taken on their trips to Russia. Those attending will also have a chance to see the film "Russian Life Today—Inside the Soviet Union". Dr. Edman, who will address the group Nov. 10 following the showing of this film, is a noted educational authority whose extensive background includes elementary, secondary and college teaching, and work with the Bureau for International Education; work with the Office of Military Government in Bavaria where she helped with re-education programs between 1946 and 1950; and work as a consultant in teacher education in Lebanon and Vietnam from 1955 to 1957. Admission is free. Miss Lloyd has invited all who are interested to call or visit the library as soon as possible, since registration is limited and tickets are obtainable by advance registration only.

\$12 Billion Yearly Is Accident Toll

How many schools and hospitals could you build with 12 billion dollars a year? Quite a few. Yet, according to the national safety council, this is the amount accidents cost the nation in 1958.

The council's 1959 statistical yearbook, reports that wage losses alone from accidents amount to nearly four billion dollars. Medical fees and hospital expenses accounted for another 950 million dollars. Property damage, production loss and insurance costs took the remainder of the 12 billion dollars.

Odds are that if your car isn't up to snuff, safetywise, the fault will be with the rear lights, brakes, front lights or exhaust system. When a hazard is found at vehicle safety checks, those four problems are the ones that crop up most often.

Saturday—not Sunday—is the most dangerous day of the week for drivers. About one out of every five traffic fatalities occurs that day. Sunday is second most hazardous.

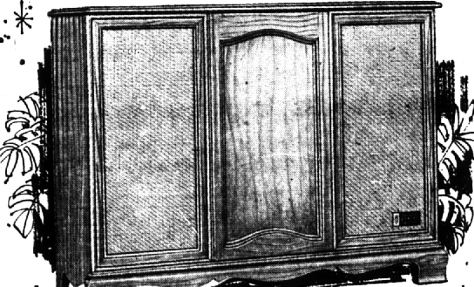
