**More People Per Sq. Mile Here Than Avg. Urban Area**

**NEW YORK**—There are more people per square mile in Birmingham than in most urbanized areas in the United States. The population density, locally, is well above average.

Such are the conclusions reached through studies undertaken by the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Commerce and other agencies to discover how much of the land area of the country is being used, and for what purpose.

But the nation's cities and their environs now cover 1.5 million acres of land, which amounts to 6 percent of the 1.9 billion acres, excluding Alaska and Hawaii.

**HOW FAR WE ARE** from being overcrowded in the foreseeable future becomes dramatically clear when it is pointed out that only 1 percent of the land area of the country is being used for living purposes and an additional 2 percent of it for working space.

The figures show that Birmingham, on its 4.7 square miles of land, has a present population of 5,494 persons per square mile.

This compares with 849 persons per square mile in the rest of the organized part of the country. Not included in this average are the nation's five cities over a million.

**IN 1950, WHEN** the census showed Birmingham's population to be 15,500, the density locally was 3,297 per square mile. It is

**Safer Here, But Watch Your Step; They Happen**

**NEW YORK**—What are the chances, if you are a resident of Birmingham, of going through an entire year without having an accident of some sort?

On the basis of a survey made by the Public Health service, covering the entire country, there is more likelihood locally than in most communities in the United States.

**TAKEN INTO** account in the survey were all types of accidents, including those sustained on the job, in traffic, while flying, while swimming or boating and in the home. The last is by far the most frequent.

During the year ending June 30, 1958, reports the Government, some 37,000,000 people in the nation were involved in accidents that called for medical attention or required confinement for a day or more.

Among residents of Birmingham, in the 12-month period ending January 1, 1958, there were 10 fatalities resulting from accidents, stated the Public Health service in its recently-issued report. Of these, 7 were due to auto accidents.

**THE FIGURES** refer to all fatalities involving local residents, even if they occurred elsewhere. Not included, however, are local accidents affecting non-residents.

The toll in Birmingham was low from a population standpoint. It amounted to a rate of 39 fatal accidents per 100,000 people.

The average in the United States was 55 per 100,000. In the East North Central states it was 52.

**THE FIGURES** show that the female is a more careful person than the male. Injuries to women and girls added up to about 20,000,000 in the year, compared with 27,000,000 for men and boys.

For every fatal accident in the United States, it is stated, there are 493 others that are not fatal. The cost is tremendous. The National Safety Council puts the bill at more than \$12 billion a year, covering lost wages, medical and
