Convenience, Courtesy, Quality Sell B'ham

Convenience, courteous merchants and clerks, quality, atmosphere and wide selections seem to be drawing customers into the Birmingham shopping area—according to the partial results of a recent survey.

Chitting and hardware seem to be the commodities the majority of shoppers are seeking.

"THE BULK of shoppers seem to come from the northwest and southeast corners of the city at this point, City Planner Herbert Herzberg said.

Herzberg, still in the process of tabulating the results of the Sept. 19 survey of shoppers conducted by the Birmingham Jaycees, came up with these and other tentative conclusions about the habits, likes and dislikes of the Birmingham shopper.

"By convenience, I mean accessibility—Birmingham is easy to get to," he said. "But, once they get here," he went on, "the story changes."

"PARKING SEEMS to be the chief complaint so far," Herzberg said. "Some think there isn't enough; others just don't like meters. Some don't like nickel-fed meters."

Surveyors stopped people from Plint, Coldwater, South Haven, and as far away as Mexico City. "These, of course, we're not counting," the planner said, "since they aren't representative of our 31 square-mile trade area."

"The results of the survey will have to be tailored to give an accurate representation of the ground

we actually covered," Herzberg said.

The ground covered was less than originally planned. Fifteen surveyors were scheduled to work that Saturday morning; only nine could make it.

Question-askers were stationed in front of Blossy's, Danby's and LaBelle's on Maple. On Woodward they worked in front of Mulholland's, Bodine's, Davidson's, the Birmingham Camera shop and Lake's. On Pierce a surveyor worked in front of Slenderella.

"Block 2 (bounded by Woodward, Maples, Hates and Willets) seems to be drawing twice the number of shoppers as any other."

"We'll have some definite and some very interesting conclusions when the results are tabulated," Herzberg said.
