Portable Chapel Days Gone At Our Shepherd Lutheran

Our Shepherd Lutheran church has a birthday Sunday. It has been ten long, but fruitful years since members began worshipping in a small portable chapel. Now at the 14 Mile road-Melton site stand a crisp, contemporary structure built in 1951.

When Our Shepherd began Oct. 10, 1949, under the guidance of the Rev. H. G. Allwardt, there were 14 communicant members and 34 children enrolled in the Sunday school.

The present communicant membership is 815 with 710 children enrolled in Sunday school and 170 in the Christian day school.

Lecture Series 'Types of Men' Slated at Kirk

Seven talks with men will be given by Dr. Harold C. DeWind, minister of the Kirk in the Hills, beginning at 7 a. m. next Wednesday.

This autumn series of talks resumes after the summer vacation period, the Kirk's weekday morning ministry to men.

Dr. DeWind inaugurated this ministry to the men of the community last year. The services met with such an enthusiastic response from the men of the parish that they have become a regular part of the Kirk's services.

This year the minister will speak on "Types of Men":

- Nov. 18—The Ideal Type.

The talks are designed to help men understand themselves, to work more effectively with men of different dispositions, to appreciate the potentialities in all kinds of personalities and to discover how God can use any type of temperament.

Following the services, which are open to any who may wish to attend, coffee and rolls will be served.

'Healing Truth' Topic of Speech At Christ Scientist

Elisabeth Carroll of Memphis, Tenn., spoke on "Christian Science Makes Healing Truth Available" Sunday at the First Church of Christ Scientist.

In her talk, Mrs. Scott said, "Every thoughtful human being recognizes that there must be an ultimate truth to which all thoughts aspire. He longs to know this absolute truth. He is convinced that when he arrives at truth, he can rest that all of his uncertainties will disappear."

"We are, of course, greatly interested in the true status of man," she continued. "Naturally so, for we are greatly interested in ourselves, in our own possibilities and in our latent capacities for good."

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE, she said, furnishes one with knowledge of the true self and shows how to bring out this true self in everyday experience. It differentiates clearly, she stated, between the false belief of man as mortal, destined to die, and the immortal man created by God to express Him throughout eternity.

Stories of Mexico, including background on the Protestant missions there, will be told and depicted in colored slides Oct. 11 by Dr. W. Glen Harris of the First Presbyterian church.
