Area Men Join Air Reserve

Three Birmingham area residents have joined the 9600th Air Reserve squadron located in Royal Oak. It has been announced by Lt. Col. Stuart D. Rodgers, commanding officer.

Rodgers said that recent additions have now boosted the squadron strength to 122, including Air Force veterans from a dozen north Detroit communities.

Among the new members are: Capt. Wendell L. Riegle, 1817 Indian Trail, Bloomfield Hills; and Capt. Norbert J. Fox, 2909 Berkshire Ave., and First Lt. Richard E. Lierle, 1035 North Woodward, both of Birmingham.

CAPT. RIEGLE is a 16-year veteran of the Air Force and served as a navigator in the South Pacific during World War II. A graduate of Bowling Green university, his military specialty now is budget officer.

Capt. Fox, whose service with the Air Force dates to 1943, was a pilot in the European theater of operations during World War II. A graduate of the University of Detroit, he served on active duty from 1946 to 1956.

Lt. Lierle entered the Air Force in June, 1953 and served on active duty through 1954. Holder of a master's degree from the University of Michigan, his military specialty is research and development staff assistant.

This is revealed in the 1959 edition of the statistical yearbook published by the national safety council.

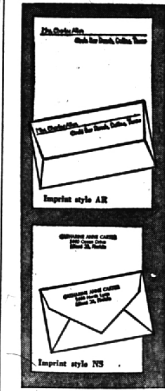
The booklet shows that 1,285,000 persons have died in this century in motor vehicle accidents.

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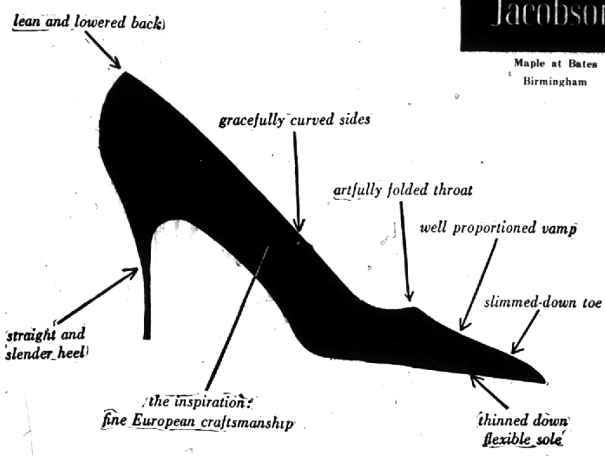

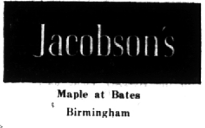
