New Education Director Named at First Baptist

The Rev. William W. Sutterlin of Portland, Ore., is the new director of Christian education for the First Baptist church, Charles Morse, chairman of the interviewing committee announced this week.

Rev. Sutterlin and his family left the west coast Aug. 31 for Birmingham. A reception for the Sutterlins is slated from 6 to 8 p.m. Sept. 20 at the church social room. Rev. Sutterlin and his wife, Ruth, have a daughter, Judy, 11, and two sons, Mark, 7 and Philip, 2½.

TO THE Birmingham First Baptist congregation, Rev. Sutterlin writes: "From the first moment of our visit in Birmingham, we felt the warmth and interest of the people of the First Baptist church. The people of the west are supposed to be very friendly, but we can say you all exceeded. We are now looking forward to making new friends. Our first expectancy is the joy of getting to know you and working with you. We pray that this will be a happy fruitful time together."

REV. SUTTERLIN is a graduate of the University of Redlands where he received his bachelor's degree and the Berkeley Baptist divinity school where he received his bachelor of divinity degree. He has served as youth worker at Palo Alto, as student pastor at Minidoka Japanese Relocation Center in Idaho, and as pastor of a community church in a war-time housing development under the Richmond, Calif., council of churches—still during his seminary training period.

years, the pastor of the First Baptist church of Cottage Grove, Ore., and at Portland, the minister of education at "White Temple."
