

## Rescue League To Present Antique Show

Many outstanding displays are to be present, among the glassware some rare coin glass. The lobby will be set up to represent something from each exhibitor, and where visitors can sit and chat over coffee and cake.

PROCEEDS from this year's Fair will go toward expanding enclosures for dogs and cats. The Shelter is in operation at 790 Featherstone road, Pontiac, and has placed hundreds of animals and investigated many cruelty cases. Although handicapped by lack of room and funds, injured animals are cared for as long as six months waiting their owners or to be placed in new homes when well.

THE WORK is not confined to domestic pets alone, as chickens, rabbits, skunks, raccoon, opossum, owls, birds and even geese are turned over to us.

There are dozens of animals available, from the cute little mutts to registers, purchased animals. Visitors are welcome Monday thru Saturday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

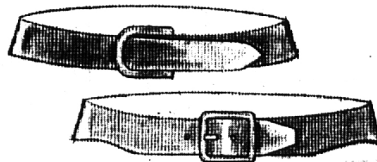

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## Newlyweds To Reside In Bay City

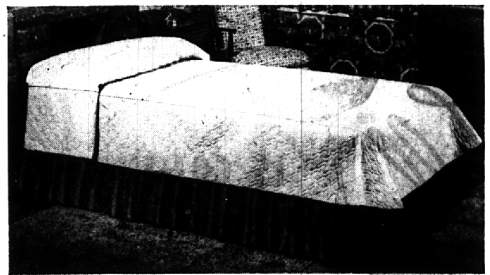
