gave 300 pounds of honey a year and fruit trees which appreciated their role, all added up to a wonderful experience with the good earth. It was so much fun that the vegetables and fruit raising still means a good living to them. Today, Irving is really fascinated by the many gadgets to make gardening easier. He has a Howard cultivator and can cultivate a plot 150 x 50 feet in one hour. The electric hoe is terrific and even a woman can run it with speed through all of the shrub beds.
