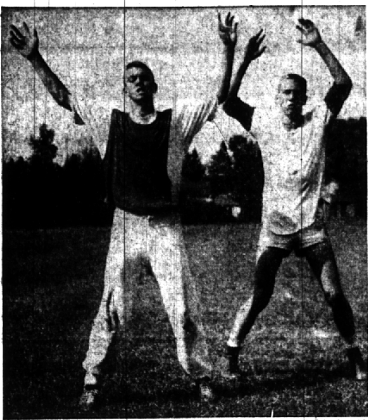


Seaholm Coach Makes Switch in Backfield



Quarterback Bill Mosher and lineman Roger Rothenburger start loosening up for another workout at Cranbrook in preparation for the Seaholm game to be played a week from tomorrow. Crane Coach Fred Campbell will continue the two-a-day workouts until Friday since Cranbrook does not open until Sept. 21.

Campbell's Hopes Carried By Five Untested Players

There are five key players in Cranbrook Coach Fred Campbell's plans this year. Besides the seven tested veterans, Campbell's hopes for a good season rest on the shoulders of five untested players who are slated for first-string berths.

Of the seven returning lettermen, three of them are juniors and four of the five prime candidates are also juniors.

IT IS POSSIBLE that Campbell would have seven juniors on the starting eleven.

The veterans are quarterback Bill Mosher; halfbacks Jim Williams and Larry Weis, and fullback Tom Denrick.

In the line are tackles Tod Williams and Pete Thinsgard and end John Hayden.

Backing up these posts are Arthur Glick, Greg Thompson, Tom Bennett, Steve Erickson, Tim Casey and Stu Colton.

Cranbrook school will not open until after the Seaholm game a week from tomorrow night and Campbell may have several players added to the roster after school opens.

If most of these players come through and the team can avoid any serious injuries, then Cranbrook can expect to have a fair season.

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Along the Sidelines with Bill Arthur

After you have been in this business for a while, you soon realize that most coaches are pessimistic souls who can see nothing but disaster for the coming season.

Most of the Birmingham-Bloomfield area coaches, however, seem to be a breed apart in that they try to give a fair appraisal of their teams.

EXAMPLE: Seaholm high Coach Carl Lemle admits that this is one of the best teams he's ever had and unless everything goes wrong at the same time, his team will be in contention for the title.

Example: Cranbrook Coach Fred Campbell believes his team is on the way back after a disastrous season and feels that the youngsters moving up from the reserves will help considerably.

Example: Southfield Coach Monte Charles is slightly optimistic even though he doesn't have many veterans. Rookies and sophomores have been showing up well in practice.

Example: Detroit Country Day lost the championship in the final day of the season last year to Lutheran East and Coach Dick Anderson is starting a rebuilding program.

BLOOMFIELD HILLS Coach Don Hoff had bright hopes for his team, too, even though he was in the midst of a rebuilding phase of the football team.

That was before he lost three key players and he is still wondering about a fourth.

Mike O'Grady's family moved to South Carolina; Gichrest's parents were moved to Switzerland by one of the automotive firms, and Barry Wickstrom's family purchased a farm near Lapeer.

A FOURTH player is contemplating a move to an exclusive prep school and Hoff believes the youngster will make the change.

HOFF HAS BEEN working with backfield men Art Trezenza, a sophomore quarterback, Ricky Clark, Bill Jones and Don Hayes.

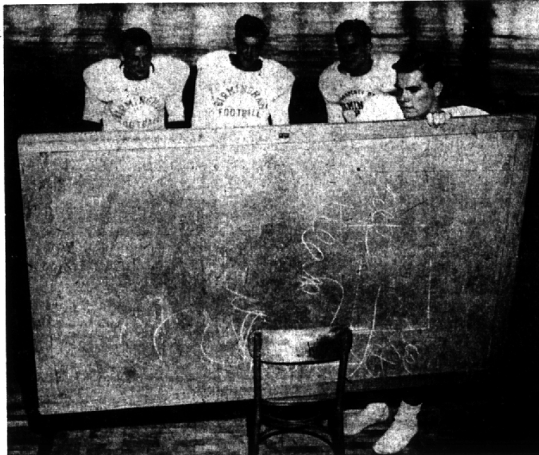

Local '11' DCD Students Prepare Joins CYO For Many Road Trips League

The biggest little football league in Michigan, and one of the biggest in the country,

That is the Catholic Youth Organization grade school boys' grid loop which will begin its 18th campaign the week of September 27 with a regular-season enrollment of 112 schools from Detroit and 38 neighboring communities.

LAMPHERE and Harper Woods are the only teams that will trace the field at 13 Mile and Lahser this year.

This quirk in the schedule resulted from the schedule two years ago when Detroit Country Day first moved to the new site.

The football field was not completed in time for the 1957 campaign and all of the games were participated.

Nine new schools have joined the league this season while one of the 1958 entrants did not return, leaving a gain of eight clubs.

The newcomers are Birmingham Queen of Mayors, Blessed Sacrament, Dearborn St. Martha, St. John the Evangelist, Plymouth Good Counsel, Romed St. Clement, Taylor Township St. Cyril of Jerusalem, Walled Lake St. William and Wayne St. Mary.

THE CIRCUIT has enjoyed a steady increase in size since inaugurated in 1942 with a dozen teams. In the past five years, the league has added 43 new clubs to its roster.

The league has a maximum weight of 135 pounds at all times. Any boy who has not reached his 15th birthday by the time the season begins meets the age requirements. All players must be in the eighth grade or less.

Connelly runs the circuit in big-league style. The league adheres to the rules governing high school play eight-minute quarters while the prep play 12-minute periods.

All coaches are completely outfitted and under the direction of adult coaches.

Most officials have had some previous official following. Two paid officials handle each game.

THE HUGE entry will be partitioned into 14 divisions. Each division will play a seven-week schedule to determine its champion or co-champions. There is no postseason playoff for league honors.

Lions Set For Rematch With Browns

QUARTERBACK Rote got hot for the first time this season. He passed for 272 yards and gained 10 yards on the ground. He led both teams in passing and running. Three of his 18 completions were for 40 yards each.

LEMLE STRESSED defensive work during the last few workouts and has been alternating some players.

In the offense he had Pete Russ at center, flanked by Bob McKenzie and Dick Rohn or Grant MacLennan.

Leigh Stowell and Bob Kling have been at tackle with Phil Isbell and Tom Mookien at end.

BOYD MAYHEW replaces Isbell when their opponent has the ball while Garrett Rice and Craig Forze take over the guard slots from McKenzie and Rohn.

Rod Ruddy takes one defensive halfback post and Isbell becomes a linebacker along with Revee. Hartung is the other defensive halfback and Forrest is a safety.

Tuesday afternoon's workout in the 50-degree temperature prompted Lemle to use drastic "cooling off" measures.

EVERY 20 minutes, Lemle would squirt the boys with the big watering hose.

The boys, who were in tee-shirts and shorts, didn't seem to mind the hoseings in the least.

Springdale Holds Club Tournament

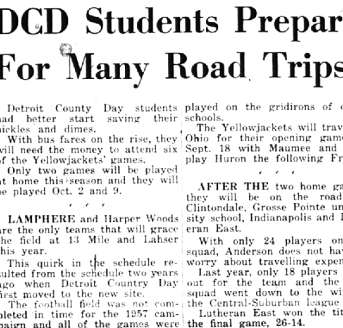
Springdale will hold its annual club tournament for men and women beginning Sept. 20, according to Club pro Dale Ralph.

Mrs. Hill Captures Title

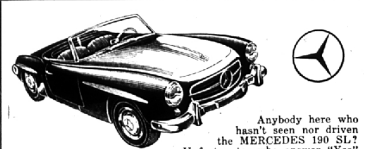
