most one-third more than the average college graduate. However, the air academy has the cadet 11 months a year, the college less than nine months.

These cadet studies are in four basic groups:
Basic sciences (chemistry, physics, math, biology, etc.).
Applied sciences (mechanical drawing, aerodynamics, thermodynamics, astronomy).

Social sciences (English, history, psychology, foreign language, politics, science).

Airmanship (leadership studies, military training, navigation and physical training).

CLASS SIZE averages 14 cadets. Instructors stay only an average of four years. Then they go from the field on active duty, although it is possible they may return to the academy for another duty tour.

"We don't want our faculty to become too bookish or theoretical, and therefore impractical," was the way one officer put it.

The facility consists only of career officers. This is considered most important to motivate the cadet corps to staying in military school.

"We invest a great deal of money and time in these boys—we want it to pay off in military careers," it was explained.

From the appearances and actions of the cadet corps this reporter had, the investment is going to pay off very well.

to go up as a result of our intended expansion plans," Egbert reassures authority members. Southfield city will be the primary recipient of the amendments' benefits. Southfield now is using less than 7 million gallons daily, while ultimate predictions are for 40 million gallons.

HOWEVER, EXPLAINED Egbert, present contracts require a member to be using all his water before the authority can provide additional supplies.

In other words, no capital improvement funds can be accumulated in order to put water mains into areas where a demand exists.

The authority eventually will put Southfield city mains up Northwestern from 8 Mile to Evergreen, up Evergreen to 12 Mile. Also to Telegraph.

Also on 12 Mile, from Greenfield to Lukster, on 12 Mile from Greenfield to Telegraph, and on Telegraph from 12 to 13 Mile.

A mile of new water main would be constructed on Southfield from Beverly Hills and Birmingham supplies.

Birmingham commission has tentatively approved the contract amendments.
