**Tag Days Down To Two for '59**  
Only two Birmingham organizations have conducted street corner tag days this year, compared to 11 in 1958, a survey by the city clerk's office shows.  
What better time, then, to prohibit all such tag days than right now? City Commissioner Carl F. Ingraham asked.  
"I hesitate to see outside organizations start to take advantage of the situation because our Birmingham groups are eliminating such events," Ingraham explained.  
RECENT commission policy is to limit tag days to an average of one each month. In 1956, there were 17 such events, with 16 in the city clerk's office shoes.  
City Attorney James Howlett was asked to search city regulations to see if tag days can be prohibited. They now are permissible.  
Because of growing public resistance to the number of tag days, many organizations have gone to other methods of raising funds.
