## Evolution and Elegance Theme of '59 Collection

"Evolution and Elegance" was the theme of the 1959 fall collection of Ruth Joyce originals recently at her Livermore shop.

The 10th fall collection by Ruth Joyce and assisting designer, Don Nagel, is evolutionary in slimmer daytime clothes with the 1959 bust dart extending to the arm eye for a beautiful molding of the body.

**TRICKY SIDE** darts will be taken in at the waist for a smooth fit in the one-piece, bodiless dress. The sleeve width is exaggerated and the sleeve shortened to just below the elbow. These give a new look to the free form coat.

Colors in this collection: black and gray predominate in daytime wear, the grays ranging from medium to dark charcoal and all black costumes very smart.

**BROWN OR TAUPE** is Ruth and Don's third choice for color. They point out that navy is not

as important this year in daytime clothes. Daytime clothes will be mostly slim . . . no circular skirts nor big petticoats for daytime. The tunic effect will be used in a couple of ways suggesting a shorter skirt length without being really short.
