Expand 'Any Deer' Season for Hunters

LANSING, Sept. 18—Under this fall's liberalized special deer seasons in Michigan, "any deer" hunting will be open in 20 crop-damage and food-shortage areas covering 18,457 square miles. Some 100,500 special permits will be available to hunters.

Last year, 13,670 square miles fell under special seasons in 37 areas. "Any deer" permits were issued to 55,255 hunters who killed 25,000 antlerless deer.

ALTHOUGH starvation and hunting lower its numbers during the winter and fall, the herd is increased each spring by the fawn crop which exceeds both of these losses.

Similarly, the range's food supply recovers during the summer after being reduced by browsing in the fall and winter.

While both rebound each year, the range does not keep pace with herd in its recovery. Thus, the vicious cycle continues and the gap between the herd and its food supply is increasingly widened.

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THIS FALL'S liberalized measures are expected to raise special kill to 45,550.

"Why the increase?" "How are special areas determined?" "What guides the overall program?"

Basically, the answers to all three questions are built from the Conservation Department's equation of "deer herd versus deer range." Unless the range is capable of carrying the herd, both will suffer.

ACTUALLY, both have suffered steadily over the years. The deer range has deteriorated and, consequently, crop-damage and food-shortage areas have spread.

This problem goes directly back to the herd. There simply have been, and still are, more deer than the range can adequately handle.

From the herd's standpoint, one of the most serious results has been starvation, a waste in the woods which annually claims tens of thousands of white-tails.

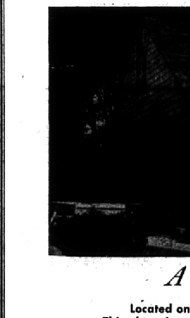
Upon completion of the school all graduates will be sent to the Marine Corps Recruit depot in San Diego, for further electronics instruction.
