A discussion was in progress on the various merits of the Cranbrook-Birmingham (now Seaholm) high school football contest that will open the only athletic season worth opening tomorrow night.

For those who have not followed the fortunes of these two teams, Seaholm Coach Carl Lemle and several of his students will engage Cranbrook Coach Fred Campbell and a few of his proteges.

According to the schedules posted rather freely about town, the game is supposed to start at 8 p.m. under the lights at Seaholm high.

After listening to several conversations concerning this particular contest, it is recommended that you plan on arriving rather early, say, 7:30 or so.

This advice is free and is based on the idea that only 6,000 or so fans can fit into the stadium.

There are also rumors flying around town to the effect that this is the last time that Seaholm and Cranbrook will meet.

Cranbrook gridders came to school four weeks ahead of time to play this game and the regents at the prep school believe it is asking too much of their time to return to school that early.

BIRMINGHAM, HOWEVER, will not lose their neighbors from down the road since it is fairly certain that the Cranes will be placed on the Wylie E. Groves schedule.

It is impossible for Seaholm to schedule Cranbrook later in the season because of league commitments and other rivalries in the form of Royal Oak Dondoro and Southfield.

A school, the Cranes will start playing Groves next season. For the figure filberts, the contests were fairly even before 1940 when Cranbrook and Birmingham split four contests each.
