Science Journal Notes Localite

TAMPA, Fla.—The National Association for Research in Science Teaching will publish an article by Clark C. Hudson, 1619 S. Bates, Birmingham, in the December issue of their official journal.

Professor Clarence M. Pratt of the University of Tampa, Editor of Science Education, announced last week that Hudson's article has been scheduled for December publication in this national journal.

Hudson, now a freshman at the College of Wooster in Ohio, wrote about his experimenting with acid chambers, conducted at Seaholm high school and in his parents' basement last spring. His work will be of interest to other science educators, as is that of the professors and scientific experts who write for Science Education.

"Considering the current importance of education in science, the Birmingham area should be proud to have a national author who is so young," said Carl H. Zwineck, Seaholm high school physics instructor.

Courthouse Bid Is \$9,270 Less 2d Time Around

Lower quotations were received by the Oakland county supervisors when they opened bids last week for construction of the courthouse unit of the proposed new Oakland county service building.

It was the second time since April, when awards were made and later rescinded, that the supervisors bid, when Adams, 410 Fairfax, gave \$9,270 less on the \$3 million building.

A low architectural bid of \$2,061,000 was submitted by W. O. Burke company, Detroit. A Dearborn firm which was low bidder previously did not bid again. The firm filed suit in circuit court against the supervisors when they awarded the original contract to a firm whose bid was \$11,537 higher. Supervisors then followed by rescinding contract awards.

Royal Oak Sued After \$2 Million CBD Assessment

ROYAL OAK—A court suit challenging the validity of an assessment against downtown property owners was filed in Oakland county circuit court less than 16 hours after the Royal Oak city commission approved the assessment last week.

The commission hopes to raise \$2 million.
