Eugene Heth's Colorful Life Ends at 80

Death put a sudden finish to the colorful career of Eugene Heth, one-time Birmingham farmer, painter, and pioneer aviator, Thursday, Sept. 17.

Funeral services were Monday at the Manley-Bailey funeral home, Birmingham, for 80-year-old Heth, a Tampa, Fla., resident for the past eight years.

Mr. HETH was born and reared on a farm at 13 Mile road west of Southfield. He was a graduate of Hill high school, Birmingham.

An "Earlybird,"—one of the first 50 men to make frequent flights with heavier-than-air machines—Heth made his first flight near Boston June 27, 1911.

He managed to come through the early years of flying without a scratch, although he toured the country putting on exhibitions at fairs and carnivals.

HIS AERIAL activities earned Heth the nickname "Wild Bill." Survived by his wife, Lillian, a son George, of Detroit, and a sister, Mrs. Thomas Navin of Tucson, Ariz., he was interred in Greenwood cemetery, Birmingham.
