Deham Education Plan Not New, Claims Writer

To the editor: A copy of the Birmingham Eccentric of September 10th was sent to me. An article on the Deham Plan appeared on page 6-D, the text of which was similar to a New York Times article dated June 14, 1959. I have openly opposed the Deham Plan, as appears from newspaper clippings which I am enclosing from the Deham

Transcript. Your readers might be interested in knowing how this Plan came into being. The name is actually a misnomer as the team-teaching technique was put into the Deham schools by our Superintendent who is writing his doctorate's thesis on "The Construction and Validation of an Instrument to Measure Teaching Services in Grades Four, Five and Six." The Superintendent is studying the experiment in grades 4, 5 & 6. Three B.U. research fellows and the Deham superintendent supervised the project.

WHEN PARENTS first realized that an experiment in team-teaching was being carried on in all the schools they assumed that Deham was participating in the experimental process which had been approved by leading educators. As facts were gathered the team-teaching idea as carried on in Deham was not a revolutionary new technique; the technique was administrative in nature. The concept that a child can be better educated by several teachers instead of one; etc.

Public Buildings Need Caretakers, Writer Suggests

To the Editor: I was distressed to read of the vandalism perpetrated by Birmingham high school several days ago. It can be prevented, in an easy practical way. This is to make use of the European tradition of a concierge, a man who caretakes this past year a husband, wife, and child or two.

Practically every large private and public building in Europe makes use of a resident caretaker to look after the property around the clock. This applies to schools, factories, and office buildings.

MANY EUROPEANS are amazed to learn that it is the practice in the USA to leave property worth hundreds of thousands of dollars absolutely vacant and unattended for long periods of time. It would be easy to arrange for a small apartment in a school, for resident caretakers, the equivalent of the concierge of France and Switzerland.

HOW DO THE children feel about this? They feel first of all the newness of being able to talk in class, but after a time they sense the lack of motivation of competition, of teacher contact, and of drill.
