Rubbish Collection Hints Issued by Beverly Hills

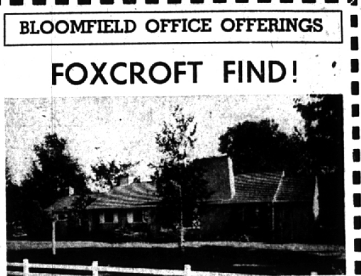
BEVERLY HILLS—Five specific regulations regarding the collection of rubbish in Beverly Hills were compiled this week by Councilman Leo J. Linsenmeyer.

According to Linsenmeyer, a number of complaints have been received recently regarding rubbish collection by the village contractor.

"I am happy to report," he said "that upon investigation every case has been resolved as a case of residents not being fully aware of the regulations which are a part of the contract, or the result of increased early morning scavenging by itinerant junk men."

"There has been increasing reports of unattended collectors rummaging through the trash set out by residents. They collect private newspapers and discarded household articles. This actually saves the village money by quickly removing and discarding rubbish containers and allowing loose newspapers to be blown about the streets. We will call the Public Safety Department and report incidences where your yard has been cluttered as a result of cases."

"AS A REVIEW," Linsenmeyer continued, "we list below the specific regulations which have been adopted at the time of the new contract. All bushes and branches must be cut and tied in lengths of less

Troy Woman Foster Parent To Russian Girl

SOJA LESZCZENKO TROY—Soja Leszczenko, a nine-year-old Russian-Ukrainian girl living in West Germany has been financially adopted by Mrs. Margaret Von Braun, 3021 Paddington, Troy, through the Foster Parents Plan, Inc. of New York City.

Mrs. Von Braun contributes \$15 a month toward the child's support. Soja will receive \$3 each month as an outright cash grant. The remainder is used for periodic food and clothing packages, medical services and education.

SOJA'S PARENTS were departed from Russia during World War II and used as slave labor by the Nazis. Her father was wounded in battle and later confined to a POW camp.

Because of illness Soja's father is no longer able to work. Her mother, in poor health, is also dependent. The family was totally dependent on a monthly grant of \$57.50 from the Sick Fund. This left each member of the family 35 cents a day on which to survive.
