Survey Starts For East-West Expressway

SOUTHFIELD—The proposed east-west expressway in Southfield further emphasizing its feeling that the expressway will be built "with or without" Southfield's approval.

SOUTHFIELD has refused to approve the 1.8-mile section from Inland to Northwood residents. Federal law requires that cities with more than 30,000 population pay a percentage of the cost. This would amount to approximately \$500,000 for Southfield.

Southfield Eyes Half-Mill Levy For City Drains

SOUTHFIELD—Storm drains at large may nick the Christmas budgets of Southfield residents this year as the city may collect approximately one-half mill on every \$1,000 of assessed valuation. The city council has already approved the collection of .055 of a mill for \$4,400 of general drains throughout the city. This is five and a half cents on every \$100 of assessed valuation or about 27 cents on the average assessed home.
