**Reds** . . . of shiny apple and winey casts along with true vivid shades are "High Fashion." For sportswear and the younger school set, reds may run into the more orange tones.

**Heathered Violets** . . . and iris colorings and the purple group are more important this year.

**Black** . . . lots of it—a perennial favorite that's always smart and sophisticated!
