LABOR DAY SOCIETY

is a legal holiday in most states in honor of labor and laborers. We do now present some of these honored tasks to be accomplished by the ones honored to do them:

1. Plant MADONNA LILIES as soon as you can get them. They produce the most beautiful white flowers in the lily family yet their "toil not, neither do they spin!" These are the lilies probably referred to by our Lord in His Sermon on the Mount—as their history goes back to 1500 B.C.

The ones to plant are CHATEAU DE NARCE bulbs and, incidentally, we have them in stock RIGHT NOW!

2. While the foregoing item entails a small bit of planting labor, consider this one, which entails only 50c for each bulb.

It is the COLCHICUM. You buy it and, of course, you pay for it. Then you take it home, put it on the table, mantel or anywhere. Without water, soil or any other effort on your part it will soon throw out numerous pinkish-tender blooms. When through blooming you may plant it outdoors and it will be in your hair for years.

This is NOT a NOVELTY! It is a highly acceptable gift to not only your wife or husband but especially to:—

- a) A hospitalized person.
- b) An elderly person unable to get out.
- c) A sick child or person at home.
- d) A person in an apartment or hotel.
- e) A person who works at a desk all day.
- f) Any person who likes nature's colors.

3. We believe it is now time to STOP killing CRABGRASS. The many materials used for this purpose will not kill the seeds on the plants you own—AND the plants themselves will die this fall.

SAVE your dollars until next spring and BEFORE the first of May apply one of several effective PRE-EMERGENCE crabgrass killers.

4. We believe it is now time to begin your primary lawn refurbishing program and there are many angles to this particular form of labor.

Drought and fungus problems wreaked havoc in the best as well as the ordinary lawns. However, at this point there are probably more good grass plants in your lawn than you think! Therefore, this program provides time for this fact (or possible fact) to prove itself before you recklessly squander dollars and LABOR in unnecessary effort. First the lawn now needs food for the strong fall growing season. Remember that each grass plant is like a petunia or rose or subclover in that it enjoys and benefits from EATING. It again requires a 10-6-4 formula (or thereabout). (We sell very little thereabout).

Second There are dead areas from fungus, horse-shoe pitching, practice with the Nos. 9,8,7, and wedge irons, and from inapt use of a nondescript fertilizer spreader (this does not include the LAWN BEAUTY).

These areas may be loosened with a RAKE or GARDEVATOR (or SPIKED DISC.) If there is a thick thatch of dead debris the rake will do a very good job on it. The areas can then be reseeded with REGAL REGULAR or REGAL SPECIAL (depending on your income the special requires about \$8.00 more income per year). With a little luck from nature in the way of rain you can forget it—otherwise you should plan to see that the areas are moist everyday—ESPECIALLY at noon when the mean aspect of the solar—well when it's hot as..... If you have a little more dough than the rest of us you can cover the seeded areas with 1 1/2" of PEATMOSS (1 Bag = 50 sq. ft.) and cut down on your water bill by doing it every OTHER day.

NOTE: If you plan to KILL the broadleaved weeds this fall you must do this ONE WEEK before reseeding. This will change your schedule. Spray between Sept. 1st and 8th and seed a week afterwards.

NOTE:—We have a new seed mixture which contains no grass seeds such as RYE or BENT or MEADOW FESCUE.
