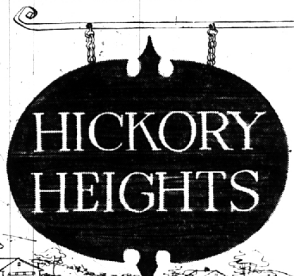
Lathrup, Beverly Police Chase Car

The car, stolen from Herman Bernstahl, 18500 Archdale, Detroit, was lodged in a ditch on Riverside near Evergreen.

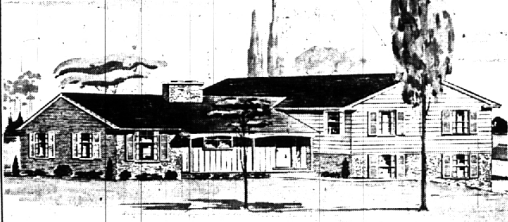
According to Lathrup police, the driver jumped from the car and fled.

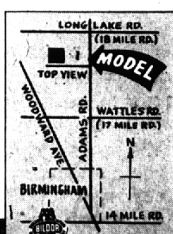

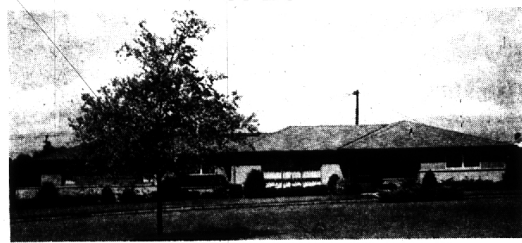
