NORTH ADAMS—The boys in the North Adams-Derby area are replacing their balls and bats for the old pigskin with the opening of Little Football League this week.

Weed-Cutting Program Eyed By WoodCreek

WOOD CREEK FARMS—With reports pending on swimming pool restrictions and a dirt removal ordinance, Wood Creek's council was asked to consider a weed-cutting ordinance for next year.

President Alger Clark recommended a village-wide program of cutting subdivided property once a year before seed pods develop, with property owners billed for a pro-rated share of costs. Councilman Wood Creek had many areas offering cover for wild life which should be preserved.

WOOD CREEK is also going to oppose Farmington township's present policy of requiring \$250 additional with building permit fees to defray costs of the Farmington interceptor sewer.

Clark and Dobson comprise a committee to discuss the matter with township supervisor Curt Hall. Clark asserted this practice was illegal and that building permits were issued through the village office.

The township has no jurisdiction on buildings except to serve as inspection agencies, by agreement could be terminated and other inspection arrangements made by the village, if necessary, Clark said.

The planning commission will be asked to render an interpretation of the word "hardship" as it applies to the zoning code in the section on side lot lines.

TWO REQUESTS for variances allowing less than the stipulated 15 feet came before the council, acting Tuesday night also as the zoning board of appeals.

Clark holly declared he could see no hardship in building a house on a 100-foot lot to meet restrictions. Other members of the council were inclined to make allowances for appearances and view such cases on their individual merits, but agreed to wait for the planning commission's verdict.

To J. W. Duhn, 31875 Lahser, who asked to see a copy of the measure before it was approved unanimously. Village Attorney Tom Dillon stated, "This ordinance is an upgrading measure. Before this the minimum lot size required in the area with highest restrictions was 75 feet. Now it's 100."

ACCOMPANYING the ordinance is a map which shows all of the village's residential area west of Southfield road as R-1 zone. All the residential area east of Southfield is R-2, with the exception of a tiny area east of Pierce near 14 Mile.

R-1 areas are at Pierce and 14 Mile and Southfield and 14 Mile. B-2 areas on the map are on 13 Mile at Southfield and Greenfield intersections.
