Returning this year are Tim DeLaney, Gerry and Terry Odum, Vern Lauri, Mike Farnely, Rick Scott and Lee Hartinger.

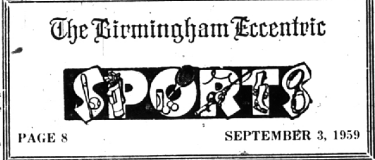
DELANEY, 5-11, 156, Gerry Odum, 5-8, 165, Farnely, 5-10, 175, Scott, 6-1, 175, and Hartinger, 6-foot, 165, are two-way men that will form the nucleus of the team.

Terry Odum, 5-8, 160, was offensive center last season, but Charles has had him working out in the backfield during the first few workouts.

Lauri, Terry's understudy, will take over the first string center slot.

Detroit Country Day's new football coach and athletic director Dick Anderson has already announced the first cut in the team.

"Right after the final game," he said with a smile.

Anderson has 24 players out for the squad, but he feels more fortunate than his predecessor, Dan Halling, who had a total of 18 players out for the first year.

Anderson was an assistant coach to Halling last season and sadly shook his head when the boys came out for their uniforms. But he stopped shaking his head as the team won game after game and ended up playing Lutheran East for the championship on the final day of the season.

The freshman coach who graduated from University of Michigan last June will take his tiny squad to Maumee of Ohio on Sept. 18 for the opening game.

It isn't the small squad that bothers Anderson now.

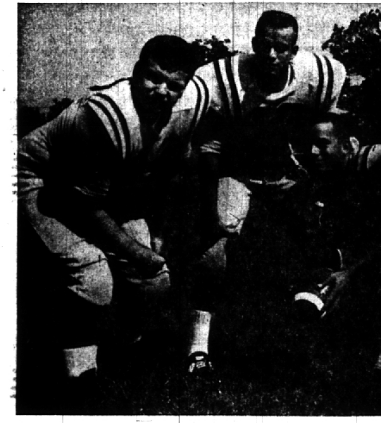
Three youngsters who had been counted on this year will not play this fall and a fourth is contemplating a change to Cranbrook.

End Warren Williams will be out with a back injury he suffered last fall and Pete Lindquist's family moved to Colorado. Ed Hill, an experienced center, has transferred to Bloomfield Hills.

Anderson has seven players that bring experience to their positions. Captain Bill Jones and Tom Derlich will fill the tackle slots. Jones is 5-10, 224, and Derlich stands 6-1, and weighs 190.

Tom Taylor is the only returning guard at 5-9, 160, while the backfield has all the posts filled. Quarterback Mike Kramer, 6-2, 175; halfback Jerry Jaffe, 5-9, 155; John Stealy, 5-8, 155, and Bill Ormshead, 4-foot, 145, have turned out for the practice.

Jaffe was the team's leading scorer last year with 16 touchdowns.

Predict Low Pheasant Kill This Season

LANSING — Sept. 2.—Conservation department game men expect this fall's pheasant kill in Michigan to dip below the one million mark for the first time since 1952.

Their kill estimate of around 900,000 birds is based on a rindneck production which suffered a noticeable drop throughout the state this year, according to breed surveys completed early this month by rural mail carriers.

IN THE southern lower peninsula—the state's prime pheasant range—single production fell 27 per cent below that of 1958.

Production plunged 53 per cent in the fringe pheasant range of Gladwin, Mecosta, Lake, Newaygo and Oceana counties.

A below-average hatching season in 1958 coupled with last winter's severe weather are chiefly blamed for the low production.

Lions Meet Eagles in Toledo In Test for Starting Jobs

Detroit Lion Coach George Wilson made a big move in unifying his squad after a 38-0 whitewash job administered by the New York Giants last Saturday. Wilson cut five players, added one and changed a few players' positions. This leaves eight players over the 35 player limit to face the Philadelphia Eagles at Toledo, Ohio tonight.

Center John Allen heads the list of released players. Also cut were rookie end Dan Chamberlain, rookie halfback Art Brandriff, rookie guard Phil Blazer and rookie center Ronnie Kees.

TACKLE KEN Russell, who was traded earlier this summer by the Lions to the Packers for Ole Spencer, is home again in a roundabout return trip. After the Packers' Russell will try to make his way to Cleveland. When Allen didn't fill the bill at center the Lions traded for tackle center Charley Ane. Ane could move into the center spot.

The Lions gave up a future draft choice for the big 250 pound tackle, Bill Glass, a defensive end, has been named at center in case of an injury to Ane. Handy man Jim Martin has also been working at center.

Another move by Wilson to strengthen the offensive line is Wayne Walker will be in the middle-linebacker position against the Eagles because of a shoulder injury to Joe Schmidt. Alex Karras was also injured and will not play. Jerry Reichow will be seen at the flanker position now. Jerry has been moved from the quarterback spot. In 1957 he caught 17 passes and three touchdowns. With Reichow moving to the flanker position Wilson was able to let go of Chamberlain and Brandriff.

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Lemle Sets Fast Pace In Session

Seaholm high school football coach Carl Lemle set a fast pace in the first practice session Monday with a chalk talk and a brisk workout.

One of the smallest turnouts in years surprised the coaches, but everyone they had counted on last season came out for the team.

ONLY 53 players turned out for the first workout and the teams started running drill almost immediately.

Contact workouts started Tuesday morning as the players began two-a-day sessions until school opens Sept. 8.

Lemle has a crop of veterans on hand, but will spend much of his time looking for a quarterback and working the reserves and newcomers to give the team some depth at every position.

Two senior ends, Boyd Mayhew, 6-2, 180, and Tom Moonen, 6-1, 180, will probably get the nod at flankers and Leitch Stowell, 6-1, 220, seems a sure thing at center.

PHIL ISBELL, 6-2, 215, and Bob McKenzie, 5-11, 185, are slated for tackle assignments while Grant McLennan, 5-11, 185, and Bob Kling, 6-foot, 215, will fill the guard slots.

Carlisle also has three returning backfield men in the form of Sam Reese, 5-10, 185 fullback; George Forrest, 5-11, 170 halfback, and Steve Jackson, 6-2, 185 halfback. Chuck Hartung, 5-8, 170 defensive halfback, may be called to the offensive platoon and will be considered one of the three quarter-back possibilities.

Newcomers expected to fill out the team include Garrett, 6-2, 245; Mike Trzinski, 6-2, 245; and Mike Hucht, 6-2, 230, all tackles, and end Hal Danne, 6-4, 190.

RON ROLPH, who graduated from Birmingham in 1953 and attended Central Michigan college, has been assigned to Seaholm from the Grove high school as an assistant line coach.

Lemle is expecting a lot of help from Rolph who was considered many to be one of the finest linemen in the history of the school.

Cranes Get Ready for Seaholm

Cranbrook coach Fred Campbell would like nothing more than to upset the forecasts of another Birmingham victory over the Cranes when the two teams meet Sept. 18.

In the eight games played prior to 1940, the teams had split the series at four each. There have been no ties.

FROM 1940 on, however, the Maple has yet to taste defeat at the hands of Cranbrook. Last year's 27-6 victory marked the first straight win for the Birmingham school.

The Cranes hope the name change in the school will help matters, but Seaholm high is just as strong this season according to seven seasoned observers.

Campbell is counting on seven veterans to form the nucleus of the team and many of the rookies seem to have the size needed to have a winning team.

RETURNING from last year's squad that won only one game were Bill Mosher, 5-10, 140 pound quarterback; halfbacks Jim Williams, 5-10, 175, and Larry Webb, 5-10, 170, and fullback Tom Demrick, 6-1, 205.

Tom Williams, 6-4, 205, and Pete Thingstad, 6-4, 190, and end John Haydon, 6-3, 190, are the only experienced men.

Rookies who have impressed coaches thus far include Arthur Alick, George Blanchard, Bill Angel, Greg Thompson, Jeff Fisher, Tom Bennett and Steve Erickson.
