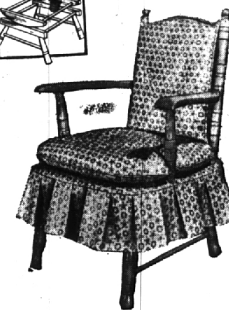

...And An Old, Gold One

An important addition to the ornithological collection of Cranbrook Institute of Science, is this Golden Eagle being presented to Director Robert T. Hatt by Al Hyde, Oakland County taxidermist. It was found in Brandon Township and is only the second Golden Eagle recorded in Oakland county history. The first was found on the Wallace Game Farm in 1926. This rare and transient bird makes only winter (November to February) visitations to Michigan and was first recorded here by Gibbs in 1879.
