Cold March Weather: Higher Heating Bill

If you think March has been unusually cold this year you are right, according to W. L. Whitfield, district manager of Consumers' Power company.

"Reports of the U. S. Weather Bureau at Lansing show an average temperature of 18 degrees above zero for the first 23 days of March," Whitfield said.

"The normal average temperature for the whole month of March, based on the last ten years, is 33 degrees."

NORMALLY MARCH is warmer than January or February, Whitfield said, but this year it is colder than either. The average January temperature this year was 26 and the average February temperature 23. These temperatures differ only slightly from the ten-year normal. For January normal average temperature is 24 for February 26.

One effect of the colder weather is to increase the gas bills of people who heat their homes with gas.

"SOME PEOPLE have wondered if the fact that we are estimating gas and electric bills while our meter readers and other operating employees are on strike," said Whitfield.

"It is true that some of the estimates may run high. Others may run low. We try to make our estimates as accurate as possible, based on the customer's past use and other factors."

In estimating the gas bills of people who heat their homes with gas, average temperatures for the period must be given careful consideration. Experience has indicated that our estimates come pretty close to the mark in most cases."

Q. *Is it advisable to use food supplied in wax containers? I have heard that the wax causes cancer.*

A. The Public Health Service and the Food and Drug Administration have studied this problem and the conclusion is that waxes used in milk cartons are harmless. Both federal agencies keep a pretty close tab on matters of this kind.

Q. *I have heard that poke root soaked in whiskey is a sure cure for rheumatism. Please tell me all you know about this treatment.*

A. So far as we can determine there is no scientific evidence that an alcoholic extract of poke root is of value in rheumatism or rheumatoid arthritis. The United States Dispensary (1950 edition) states that poke root has been employed in treating rheumatism but that there is "no satisfactory evidence that it is therapeutically useful and it is no longer prescribed by physicians."

Russia's challenge. I have no reason to doubt these statements. It should be obvious to anyone with any intelligence that we cannot survive if we continue to spend an increasingly smaller portion of our national income on education.

THIS TREND must be reversed or we may as well reconcile ourselves right now to eventual Russian domination. If it is true that by 1970 outlays for education will have doubled, how can we avoid annual increases of 6-7%? We can't postpone the day of reckoning indefinitely. Perhaps most of us are living in a fool's paradise.

Lastly, if I were running a newspaper, I would hesitate before printing unsigned letters on public issues. Removal of the shield of anonymity goes far to eliminate the inaccuracies, half-truths and distortions such as those contained in the letter carried in your columns on March 24th and signed, "A Home Owner." It's time we all stood on our own two feet, willing to be counted, one way or the other.
