

IN OAKLAND COUNTY ... No Federal School Aid, Survey Tells Broomfield

WASHINGTON — More than three out of five Oakland county residents don't want the federal government involved in school finances.

This was one of the results of a questionnaire sent to 18th congressional district homes by Congressman William S. Broomfield (R-Oakland county). Broomfield said tabulation of 9,106 replies showed that:

—Some 73.3 per cent favored federal aid for school construction.
—Only 22.6 per cent want federal aid to supplement teachers' salaries.
—54.1 per cent approved leaving education finances up to states and local school districts.

IN OTHER replies, 73.1 per cent want expansion of our program to explore outer space, 74.7 per cent urged elimination of farm price supports and 65.1 per cent favored an additional half-cent a gallon gasoline tax if revenues are used to build new highways.

Almost 50 per cent want the minimum wage increased from \$1 to \$1.25 an hour. A total of 52.2 per cent favored the establishment of a federal science academy to help train scientists for defense.

Only 10.6 per cent urged reduction of federal taxes, while 59.5 per cent said they wanted the \$280 billion national debt reduced \$4.2 billion as sought by President Eisenhower. Some 15.1 per cent wanted the surplus to be used for expansion of federal programs.

FIFTY-ONE PERCENT opposed an increase in social security taxes on employees and employers to pay for medical and hospital care for those who have retired.

Continuation of military and economic aid to friendly nations was backed by 76.8 per cent, while only 27 per cent favored recognition and trade with Red China.

Some 60 per cent okayed a one-cent postage increase to erase the \$500,000,000 postal deficit. Many indicated in letters, however, that funds needed.

THE COUNTY will need about \$3 million more to complete the 55 1/2 million structure. Rising costs have cut into the county surplus earmarked for the building. The county's share of the 15 mills collected annually from taxpayers has been limited to 5.65 mills because of school needs.

About one-half mill additional for three years would raise the extra funds needed.

County Eyes
Added Tax
For Building

County voters may be asked to approve a tax increase to finance construction of the new county courthouse, first unit of which is underway at the county service center on Telegraph road.

The county's ways and means committee, which draws up the budget proposed to the board of supervisors, last week was considering the tax proposal.

The committee indicated it may be forced to abandon its policy to pay for the building out of county budget surpluses.

State Plan
On Traffic

The Michigan state highway department feels that there is not yet enough traffic on 16 Mile road to warrant the installation of a traffic signal at Woodward.

The Birmingham city commission has approved the following program by the state highway department:

1) The construction of a directional crossover between Smith and Bird to eliminate westbound 14 Mile traffic driving to Davis to make their southward turn on US-10.

2) SINCE THE vehicle volume on Chapin at US-10 reached about 25% of the minimum requirements for signalization, it was decided that there is no justification for a signal.

3) Agreed to study the particular problem at Forest and US-10, where there has been a substantial increase in traffic accidents.

4) That a delayed amber feature be installed at US-10 and Maple road.

5) To install 82 feet of parking rail south from the corner of Hamilton to the driveway of a restaurant to prevent cars from backing into moving traffic.

Questions
Get Answers

The neighborhood opinion survey was bringing in an unprecedented return of 48.2 per cent of the questionnaires sent to Birmingham households, amazed City Planner Herbert Herzberg told the Birmingham plan board at its March meeting.

The percentage has risen to 53.6 per cent and is pushing 60 per cent, Herzberg said a week later.

"IT'S ENCOURAGING," Board Chairman Robert W. Page said, "to see this much interest in their community displayed by Birmingham residents."

The normal mail return in such a survey is approximately 10 per cent, Herzberg pointed out. A total of 1,502 questionnaires was mailed to Birmingham homes, he said.

The first high returns were from neighborhood one, in the northeast corner of Birmingham.

THE LAST of the completed questionnaires would probably be recorded near the end of April, he told the board, and conclusions drawn a few weeks later.

The board reported to the city commission that the paving of streets in the vicinity of Holy Name church (Harrison and Greenwood) would probably not increase substantially the traffic in the area.

The request for paving came from Matt. Eugene Padlock, pastor of Holy Name. Harold Hickman, 827 Harmon, had asked the board to check the possibility of an increase of traffic because of paving.
