### S'field School Board Warns Smokers

SOUTHFIELD—Adults who use Southfield school facilities were warned last week by the school board not to ignore the smoking regulations.

The discussion resulted from a letter sent by High School Principal Robert E. Hall who claimed that adult smoking during the evening programs had become a major problem.

Glen Levy, administrative assistant, said the problem exists in all Southfield schools rented to adult groups or used for adult education classes.

### S'field Councilmen Back Mayor's Veto On Expressway

SOUTHFIELD—Southfield councilmen voted 4-1 last week to uphold Mayor Donald L. Swanson's veto on the eastern leg of the east-west expressway.

Despite protests by a few Southfield residents, the council sustained Swanson's action that halts the route which lies along a general 10 1/2 mile road and severs the city's civic center site. It was originally approved March 14 by the council.

THE THREE approved expressways to date have been the Southfield road expressway from Eight to Nine Mile road, the entire length of Northwestern highway and the west leg of the east west.

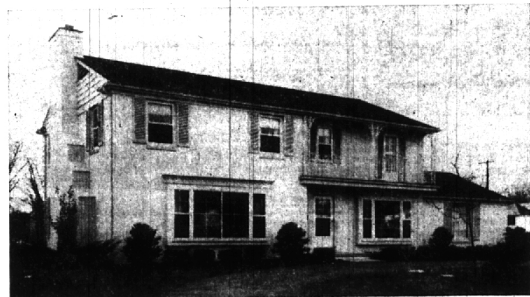
