## DOWN TO EARTH

# Roses a Favorite Of Flower Lovers

Roses, roses, everybody likes roses. There are lots of complaints about the care of them, but if you understand them, treat them right, you won't have cause to grumble.

"Place them in your yard where the sun smiles down on the arbor for six full hours, not where the sun shines before the leaves come out. Good soil is essential. There must be good drainage. If you use a hose to water the total plant, you are a sitting duck for plenty of trouble unless you spray directly after watering the leaves. Start the habit of removing the sprayer from your hose and either now water the ground only around the base of the rose or use a soaker. Feed roses beginning their second year. When growing six weeks later, then stop for the season."

LAST YEAR when I went to see the trial gardens for roses at the George Bell company in Chicago, I walked up and down the whole show of roses and these varieties looked the best to me "on the hoof." Tease the if you will, they aren't all new.

Charlotte Armstrong is light red and pink, a hybrid tea; Montezuma is a tall grandiflora and has an orange-pink flower; Roundelay is also tall and had two shades of dark red in its total flower; this looked like the best one in the race to me; Starfire is a grandiflora rose and was a mass of healthy red flowers; Tanya, a hybrid tea rose is orange; Lavender Princess is a floribunda with a lavender flower accented with prominent yellow stamens; Siren, here is a well named floribunda which is iridescent in its bright red splendor.

WHEN ROSES are mentioned, I always think of our local beloved Mary Roberts who lived at the intersection of Cranbrook and Yarmouth. What a job she has now teaching our many friends who have advanced to Heaven with her. I am sure that black spot will not be a problem to these garden recruits.

While attending these Garden Trials, I saw two bedding ideas which you might like to adapt to your lawn. Combine the verberna Torrid Red with the lower annual Purple Elbe Nierembergia. Now that will make your visitors exclaim. The second suggestion is to plant the petunia Sugar Plum which is a lush purple pink and
