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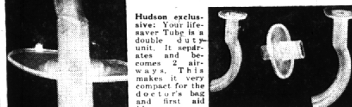
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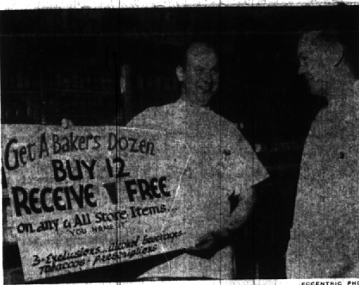


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A Baker's Dozen

No Businesses In R-7 Zones, City Decrees

There'll be no accessory business uses permitted in any multiple dwelling zones, according to an amendment passed Monday night by the Birmingham city commission.

Upon the advice of the plan board the commission was seeking to eliminate misinterpretation and to carry out the city's original intent.

The SPECIFIC amendment was made in the R-7 multiple provisions. This zone is the lowest residential classification, and is intended to go next to retail business zones.

Only one person objected. He was Earl W. Fennellus, who three months ago bought property at 544 Brown. He said his purchase was based on the feature the commission was considering eliminating.

The area affected by the change is bounded roughly by Southfield, Merrill, Hanretta and the south side of Brown street.

Because it's next to business, there is no real reason for having businesses in a residential zone, the plan board recommendation said.

Swim Club Land Annexed by City

A 4.34-acre portion of Troy township was annexed to Birmingham Monday at the city commission meeting. The land is the proposed site of the Forest Hills Swim Club.

Located on Adams near the Grand Trunk railroad tracks, it was left out of the Troy city incorporation in 1955. Oakland county supervisors approved the annexation Monday morning. The swim club plans to start construction next month.

Also okayed was the purchase of 1,300 steel folding chairs for \$4,140 for the gym area of Groves high school. Funds will come out of the school's already established construction account.

Library Plans Lambie Room

First name on the list of memorials and gifts for the Baldwin public library's new wing is that of the late Mrs. John S. Lambie, former library board president and board member.

A gift from her husband, Dr. John Lambie, will be used to furnish the new children's department and girls. It is due to be ready for use early in June.

BORN and raised in Pittsburgh, Mrs. Lambie studied at the Pennsylvania Academy of the Arts. As a young woman, she lived in the Philippines and Alaska with her young family and husband, Dr. Lambie, then a physician in the United States Army.

After coming to Birmingham, she was elected to the library board in 1923, and served as its president from 1937 until she retired in 1956.

"The many who knew Mary Lambie, who enjoyed her kindness, warmth, humor, generosity and great gift for friendship, who admired her years of steadfast service to the library," said Miss Jeanne Lloyd, librarian, "will all rejoice in this perfect tribute to a great-hearted woman, and will echo her husband's words in making the gift: she loved children and children loved her."

Another Necessity Hearing Necessary

Because two corner lots were inadvertently left out of the special assessment district, Birmingham commissioners have started over on the reasurfacing of Lakeside, from the Rouge bridge north to Quarter road.

The resurfaced a previous necessity hearing, set a new date for May 2. Few, if any, property owners are expected to attend that second meeting, which is a mere formality.

CITY MANAGER L. R. Gare said the street first will be repaved "in a few weeks" by the county DPW. Then the city will have it resurfaced.

Lakeside repaving and Redding repaving should not be done together, Gare advised.

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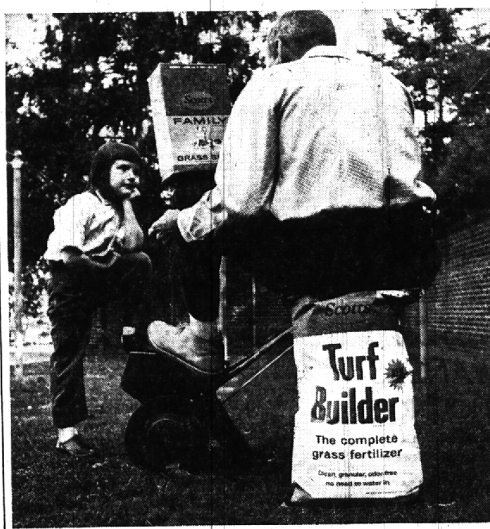
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
