**BEFORE THE RETIRING** council adjourned Monday evening, Mayor Cogger complimented the council on its work in the past year. Cogger reviewed accomplishments which included the balancing of assessments to save approximately \$25,000 in taxes, the completed engineering on a future storm water project, the clearing of easements and the quit claimed deed, the passing of plumbing, electrical and building codes, an increased water capacity, establishment of a recreation commission, the hiring of a third professional police officer, and the consolidation of city insurance.

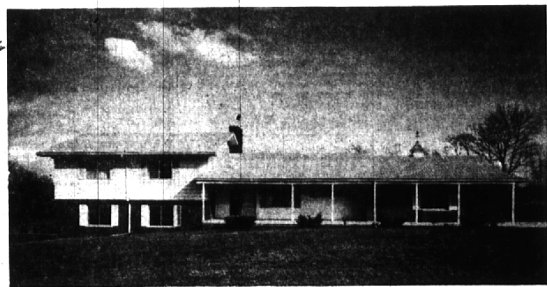
