

Hills B & E Raises Pay For Teachers

BLOOMFIELD HILLS—A slight pay increase granted teachers, a larger teaching staff for increased enrollment, and an additional school building, has raised Bloomfield Hills school district's 1960-'61 budget \$186,675 over 1959-'60. With the \$100 per teacher pay raise, salaries begin at \$4700 and increase in 12 steps to \$7200. Salaries for teachers with master's degrees begin at \$4900 and increase to \$7400.

Figures approved by the school board for the coming year's operation total \$1,686,100. Last year's budget was \$1,509,425.

INCREASED property valuation in the fast-growing school district, will take care of increased school costs, provided the present county tax allocation remains.

Instruction costs, of which teacher salaries is the largest item, accounts for \$136,000 of the budget increase.

The \$100 per teacher salary raise is costing \$15,800. The raise is less than had been asked by teacher representatives who appeared before the school board several weeks ago.

AN ANNUAL teacher salary increase, based on years of service, adds another \$21,400 to instruction fees.

Cost of staffing Conant elementary school, to be in operation this fall, as well as additional teachers for the 400 more students expected next year, totals \$60,000.

A half-day sixth grade teacher will be added at Pine Lake school. Three instructors will be added at both the high school and junior high to meet increased enrollment. The junior high will also get an additional counselor.

TWO elementary language teachers will be added, expanding the foreign language program to all elementary grades. An additional elementary P.H.S. I.C.A. education teacher will be provided.

Other increases in this year's budget are accountable to increased maintenance costs with eight

Cranbrook Club Sues Southfield Over Pool Denial

CRANBROOK VILLAGE—Suit has been filed against the City of Southfield by Cranbrook country club, following the city's refusal to permit building of a private swimming pool near 15 Mile and Evergreen.

Club committee member James L. Snodder, 29445 Fall River, said the complaint filed in Oakland county circuit court charges the Southfield zoning board of appeals did not have sufficient cause for refusing approval.

The board claimed the pool would be too close to main highways and endanger children.

Snodder said the nearest objector to the pool lived three-fourths of a mile away. No court date has been set.

S'field Township Assessments Increase \$715,130

SOUTHFIELD TOWNSHIP—Southfield township 1960 assessments have increased \$715,130. The new assessment of \$27,935,880 is for Beverly Hills, Franklin, and Bingham Farms villages. Last year's total was \$27,220,750.

Beverly Hills assessment increased \$383,000 from 1959 to total \$19,261,380 for 1960. Assessment of real estate in Beverly increased by \$119,790 but the personal property sum dropped \$36,700.

REAL ESTATE for the entire township is \$27,935,880; personal property is \$174,350. Real estate assessment in Bingham Farms is \$1,666,250 and Franklin is \$6,675,540.

Some \$6,850 was cut off the original township assessment figure as submitted by Township Supervisor Hugh G. Alletton, Jr. The township board of review nixed it from the \$27,942,530 total.

Plan Commissioners Go on Strike Over Legal Status
SOUTHFIELD—Five of seven Southfield city plan commissioners quit last week charging that they have no legal status as a commission and would not attend any future meetings until the council takes such action.

Southfield's plan commission is set up by city charter and not by state law as is the case in most Michigan communities.

The charter gives final power to the council. Under state planning act the power would belong to the planners.

Planners want the state law but councilmen are not for it. An ordinance for such a code has been pending in Southfield for almost four months.

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
