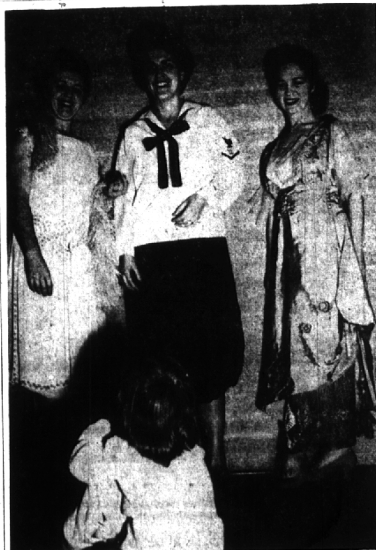
Eta Iota Chapter Names Officers
