## School Board Gives Schoenhals 3-Year Contract

SOUTHFIELD—School Superintendent Glenn Schoenhals got a small raise and a three-year extension of his contract when Southfield's school board met Monday. Starting July 1, Schoenhals' salary will be upped \$500 to \$15,500 annually.

The board also called for bids May 9 on improvements at Lathrup school's playground. The work will include seedling, filling and a small area of blacktopping.

After approving the school calendar for 1960-61, the board accepted the Lathrup recreation committee's gift of two backstops, a 12-foot goal and a net.

## Bingham Asks Three Mills For Roads

BINGHAM FARMS—Minus three of its members, including vacationing village president Haskell Wright, the Bingham Farms council moved Monday to adopt its 1960-61 fiscal budget and levy three mills for the general highway fund. With Neil Warren acting as president pro-tem, the council agreed to hold a \$2,575 general fund budget with operating expense matching income from the state, slightly increasing the publishing and posting item and decreasing the miscellaneous fund.

Expecting to collect about \$5,000 on the three-mill tax, \$2000 will be for general road purposes and \$3000 for legal fees. The village is defending its zoning restrictions in a suit brought about by several property owners on Telegraph road. No new action is expected until August, it was learned Monday night.

A \$4700 road maintenance budget from state funds will be used to care for Bingham's five and a half miles of roads.

STREET ADMINISTRATOR Donald Morse informed his colleagues that he spent \$2,367 to get the village out of the recent mud. Of this \$200 was authorized

for a general road survey and study by engineers to help determine critical areas and remedial costs. Morse explained that he never spent more at one time than he was permitted by the charter, he just spent it often.

Calcium chloriding will be delayed until spring rains are over, but the council agreed that a general grading would be done before then.

MORSE ALSO stated that petitions requesting study of costs and methods of financing black-topping on Bristol lane, Bristol court, Sager court and Brittner drive were signed by 74 per cent of the improved property owners. Council action will be withheld until 60 per cent of all property owners on those roads petition for this information. It is expected other areas of the village will also be asked to consider a similar petition; the interest of a uniform program.

A REPORT of Gifts and Webster Engineers indicate that a four-test survey made recently on Bingham road show improper side drainage and inconsistent soil conditions. An estimate of \$65.00 per

width of the bridge. If the present road were widened to 20 feet and two more feet added to the bridge, making it 18 feet wide, the total cost would be about \$29,600, Morse said.
