## Contracts Awarded For Sidewalks in Downtown B'ham

The Birmingham city commission Monday night accepted the low bid of \$17,981.84 of Alva L. Greer and Sons, Roseville, contractor, for sidewalk construction in the downtown business section.

Greer's bid, approximately \$8 under the second lowest bid, was one of seven submitted. It was 2.2 per cent below the city engineer's estimate.

Included in the project in the four blocks at Woodward and Maple are the removing and replacing of considerable sidewalks, curbs and gutters.

The city desires to have the walks reconstructed before the start of the fall shopping season.
