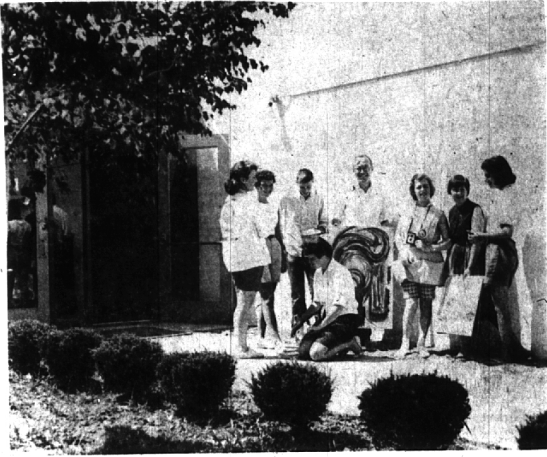

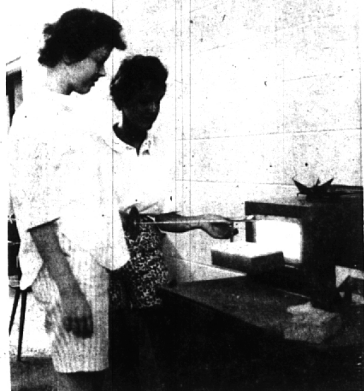
Former B'hamite Off to Good Start
