After the judges had presented the awards a question-answer period was conducted by Mrs. St. Clair to show club members the knowledge these youngsters have acquired during the classes.

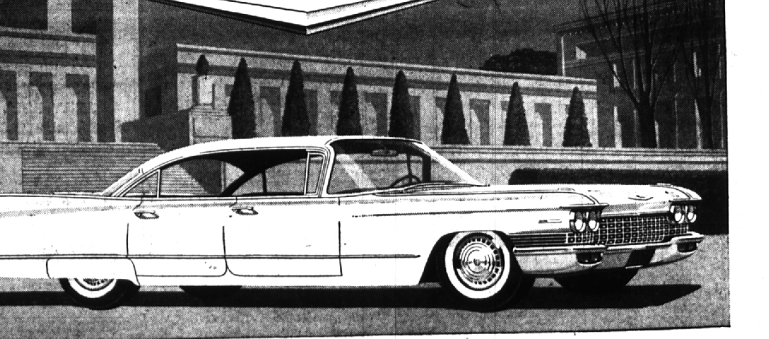
