Auto-Train Deaths Rise

A rising number of auto-train accidents during the height of the touring season has sharply increased the number of auto-train fatalities in Michigan.

Michigan State Safety Commission Chairman James M. Hare expressed concern over the mounting number of accidents involving trains and motor vehicles.

"Stop, Look, and Listen is an old-fashioned rule of the road that is still worth practicing at all railroad crossings," Hare reminded drivers.

STATE POLICE records show that in 1959 deaths caused by collisions of trains and motor vehicles decreased by 11 per cent below the 1958 total.

Last year 57 people were killed and 212 were injured in 466 accidents involving trains and motor vehicles.

Of these, 43 deaths occurred in rural areas and 14 in urban areas. "Despite the decreasing number of trains in the United States, this type of accident and fatality seems to be increasing in many states," Hare said. "I hope we can work together to reduce these accidents in Michigan."

Warn Against Home Siding Job Gimmicks

"Your home has been selected as a model in this neighborhood for an aluminum siding job."

These words spoken by unscrupulous salesmen have cost Michigan residents thousands of dollars yearly.

My investigations as attorney general indicate that the application of siding stands out as one of the most fruitful sources of exorbitant profits by those who prey upon the desire of home owners to improve their property.

And the fraudulent gimmicks used keep pace with the huge profits to be made by the unprincipled organizations using door-to-door salesmen in this business.

If you refuse to pay, you will be threatened with court action. And don't wait on the checks if you don't want to pay.


Don't fall for these gimmicks. If you are a siding job, ask for estimates from legitimate businessmen in your area.

The something-for-nothing you may think you are getting now will cost you headaches, heartaches and paychecks for many years to come.

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


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Obituary Notices

He entered the Army in 1944. Millar attended Mount Clemens High School.

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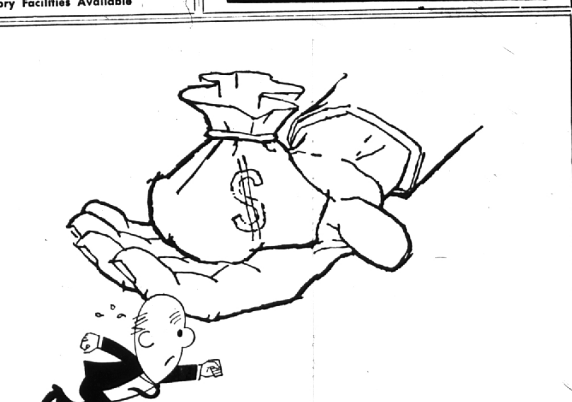
