### Cook, Don't Boil Dietitians Say

ANN ARBOR—Vegetables contain helpful nutrients, but broiling dissolves many of these vitamins and minerals into the water. They escape from all the exposed surfaces. The longer the cooking process, the more water-soluble vitamins and minerals are lost.

Therefore, say dietitians at The University of Michigan Medical Center, you should observe these cautions when cooking vegetables:

1. Use just enough water to prevent scorching.
2. Add the vegetables to boiling water in order to reduce the total time in the water.
3. Cook until just tender in a tightly covered pan.

An exception is made for green vegetables. They tend to discolor when cooked in a pan that is tightly covered. So leave the cover off for the first few minutes. This permits the escape of the volatile acids which cause this discoloration, say the U-M food specialists.

The wedding will take place Friday evening, September 2, in the Rockville Centre Methodist church.

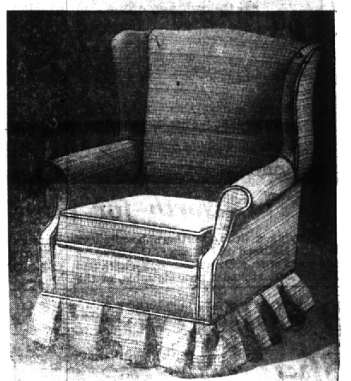
Miss Whelan is a graduate of Wells college, and Mr. Morrison is an alumnus of Cranbrook school and Brown university.
