

## Area Shows Elm Disease Rate Decline

Because of an increase of Dutch Elm disease in central and western Michigan, the loss of elm trees so far this year is ahead of that of 1958. Eastern Michigan, where the disease was discovered in 1950, is showing a substantial reduction in losses from previous years.

This is shown by a tabulation of survey results by the plant industry division, according to G. S. McIntyre, director of the Michigan department of agriculture.

At the end of July, diseased trees numbered 4706, while a year ago this figure was 1654. The figures do not approach those of a limited area in southeastern Michigan, where in the past have had as many as 5,774 diseased trees in a single year, according to C. A. Boyer of the Plant Industry division.

## Troy News Briefs

### Pool Ordinance Proves Too Deep

TROY — City commissioners swam into a pool of trouble last week when they held a public hearing on the city's proposed new swimming pool ordinance.

The commissioners dived into the problem of setting up safeguards against the possibility of private swimming pools becoming public nuisances when the Troyton Manor Swim club announced plans to build a pool in this subdivision.

Faced with four separate proposed ordinances and a wide cleavage of opinion among citizens and the commission members themselves over parking, membership and zoning requirements—among other things—the commissioners soon found they were over their heads.

**THEY GOT BACK** onto dry ground only by referring the whole matter back to the planning commission.

They'll be back in the swim Aug. 22, however, when the planning commission submits its report back to the city officials.

### X-Ray Route Final or Not?

TROY — Residents' pleas for a change in the proposed route of the Chrysler Expressway near Adams road north of Niagon Mile brought a response from state officials that Troy has already given final approval on the expressway route.

Troy's final okay was given at a June 8 meeting in Lansing when the city was represented by former City Manager David W. Hesse and Troy's planning consultant, George Villacian, Jr., highway department chief Planning Engineer, C. Cruise said.

City Commissioner Louis Yanich denied final approval was given, saying Hesse and Villacian were not authorized to act for the City of Troy.

### Council 'Split' By Table's Gaps

"IF THE HIGHWAY department is going to stick to its resolution," Yanich said threateningly, "then we'll question them on that one-and-a-half-mile that's not in the resolution."

He referred to a set of plans which shows no route along the northern part of property on Sixteen Mile which is owned by the family of Mayor Raft J. Huber.

TROY — City Commissioners may table payment of a bill from the manufacturer of a new table in the commission meeting room if the manufacturer doesn't clear up a few gaps in his work.

The shiny, new piece of furniture, set off by black and white napkins for each commissioner, showed up for its first commission meeting last week. But the corners of the table's three sections didn't meet, leaving two large V-shaped gaps.

City Clerk J. Lawson Lockhart and Engineer Joseph Shugart tried to fill the breach by sitting in the gaps, but it just wasn't what the commissioners had envisioned when they ordered the table.

"THESE TABLES are not made according to specifications," Commissioner Louis Yanich said.

"It doesn't make any difference whether they meet specifications or not," Commissioner Clifford P. Satermeister, Jr., said. "They aren't paid for yet."

### Elks Club Asking Property Rezoning

TROY — A public hearing on the request of the Clawson-Troy Elks club for rezoning from residential to commercial of property on Big Beaver road will be held Aug. 22.

The property is located across from the Big Beaver airport, between Rochester road and John R.

The club said it was planning to buy the property, but did not specify what it intended to use it for in its rezoning petition.
