DPW Calls Off Bloomfield Drain Project

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—in view of the strong protests against it, the \$44,000 drain project proposed for the 14 Mile-Lasher area has been abandoned by the board of public works. But it may turn up in Oakland county circuit court for a judge to decide on.

The action was taken Tuesday at a hearing which saw observers described as "red hot." The session at Marian high school was slated as the second hearing on the project, called for confirming the assessment roll.

About 40 residents attended the session. Before that, the DPW had received letters of objection to it from over 60 per cent of the 105 property owners involved.

MRS. ROBERT BIRD, 1451 Forest Lane, has threatened to take the issue to court if the drain failed to materialize. Heavy rains cause severe flooding of the Bird property, near where a present drainage ditch empties out flow from Marian high school and other property to the north.

The project was petitioned for by the Birds, the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Detroit, and Prudential investment company, owners of undeveloped property in the district. The petitioners own a majority of the square footage in the district, and would have paid about two-thirds of the cost.

Clarkson Man Killed in Crash On Telegraph

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—A 21-year-old Clarkson man was killed early Wednesday at Hickory Grove and Telegraph when the car he was driving veered in front of a gasoline truck.

Miles H. Hicks, fatally injured in the crash, was traveling north on Telegraph road. According to township police, he apparently fell asleep at the wheel.

Police said his car went off the road on to the bank, back across the northbound lane, veering into the path of the gas truck.

Dorchester Hills Road Assessment, Contract Okayed

FRANKLIN—Bills are going out to about 44 property owners living in Dorchester Hills subdivision for \$320 each to pay for the blacktopping of the area.

Following a public hearing Aug. 3, the council approved the creation of a special assessment district for the project and awarded the contract to the Ann Arbor construction company. About \$14,000 will be raised by the assessment, although it is expected \$13,500 will cover the costs. Any residue of these funds shall be returned to the property owners, councilman
