omended that all elementary schools remain on the same time schedule.

"THERE IS A TEACHER morale factor involved," Superintendent Otis M. Dickey explained. Some teachers have expressed an interest in transferring from schools where students are bused because it adds a heavy supervision load beyond that of work in school. It is possible, he stated, that a more acceptable 9 a.m. opening with a 2:30 p.m. dismissal in a few schools would make teaching there more attractive.

Another problem that would result from two elementary time schedules, Dr. Dickey said, is that of getting staff members together before or after school hours for in-service and curriculum work.

Birmingham's program development moves on a system-wide basis requiring coordination of meetings for teachers from all schools.

ASKING IF IT WAS possible to accelerate the schedule a half month, the group was told that some secondary students are now being picked up in the dark and that, in the winter, it would create more of a hardship. One mother asked for a simple plan of 15 minutes. Both board members and the protesting group agreed the suggestion was a plausible one. It will be discussed this week with a final decision slated at the special board meeting Tuesday.

the car sales business.

The three major objections to the plan were traffic congestion, precedent establishment and ordinance regulations. The commission cited five ordinances dealing with signs, street obstructions, nuisances, street trades and traffic congestion.

Of those, the traffic ordinance, which specifically prohibits the parking of vehicles within the main light-of-way when such parking is for the purpose of displaying the vehicle for sale or for advertising purposes, was the most restrictive.

THE ONLY WAY the request could have been granted would have been through amendment of the ordinance, agreed the commissioners. But, the commission was against setting any precedent for such matters.

"I see no alternative but to turn down the request," said Commissioner William H. Buregan, who felt approval "would be favorable only to one group."
