Council Tables Professional Zone Request

SOUTHFIELD—The year-old request of Detroit realtor Saul Waldman to rezone a part of the Kentfield Manor subdivision, at Greenfield was tabled once more last week for further study by the council.

In a public hearing held last Monday, Waldman urged the council for a decision, stating "this has wasted enough of my time as well as yours."

Having requested rezoning so that he can erect a group of professional offices in the residential area, Waldman has also agreed to comply with the demands of the homeowners association to build a masonry wall at the rear of the building, locate the access to the building from Greenfield only and install parking for lighting that would be of the low, "moonlight" type.

DELATED by the repeated delay.

Waldman questioned the constitutionality of the motion to table but was told to take his grievance to his lawyer by council president pro tem Thomas M. Costello.

Police Continue Hunt for Robbers Of Lathrup Homes

LATHRUP—Police are continuing the search for three burglars who forced their way into three Lathrup homes on Saratoga Aug. 7. Footprints indicated that the same three burglars committed the crimes.

Before they were frightened away by the return of Mr. and Mrs. G. E. Gann to their home at 18775 Saratoga, the robbers looted the house of various items totaling \$470 in value. Jewelry, a clock radio, 12 bottles of whiskey and a suitcase were taken. Two other radios were left behind as the

thieves fled. Allen Ash, 18516 Saratoga, was robbed of a .38 caliber German Luger and a wrist watch and the home of William D. O'Brien, 18550 Saratoga was also entered. Police have been unable to determine the amount taken from the latter property as the owners have been out of town.

THE BURGLARS entered two of the homes by breaking the glass in the back door and secured entry through a window of the third house.
