16,000 School-age Pupils in District

According to a census report, there are 16,426 school-age (5 to 19 years old) children in the Birmingham school district.

This does not mean, however, that there are that many children actually in school in the district. Actually, some 12,000 students are expected to enroll this year.

What does this 16,000 figure mean, then? It means that there are that many children who could be attending the district's schools if it weren't for such things as physical and mental handicaps, dropouts, parochial schools and the like.

THE CENSUS report shows that there are 566 people 19 years of age and 673 18 years of age in the district. A further breakdown reveals 901 who are 17 and 886 who are 16.

Children who are six years old are in the greatest number—1,383, according to the census.

The census report lists 2,313 children in the 5-19 bracket as being enrolled in parochial schools and 626 in private schools. There are 637 in college.
