In outerwear garments, styles

overlap from one group to the other. Starting with unlined waist-length jackets for early autumn, through mid-lengths and three-quarter-lengths for cold weather, the choice is terrific. Wash-wear poplins vie with corduroys, loden-types, meltons, blanket-types and reversibles. Look for science-fiber linings and liners and, if so inclined for parka-type hoodies and large bulky knit collars.

In dress shirts, the Ivy choices are button-down collar oxfords, tab collars, pinned round collars and tabless-tabs. Short and medium point spread collars are just right for the Continental outfits, as well as the newly revived angled front cutaway spreads.

In sport shirts, the collar choices are the same and there is also a more frequent blending of the styles worn. Keep an eye peeled for the new printed patterns in both neat and bold motifs. Madras

and madras-types are still very popular, as are the classic plaids and checks. The big colors are olives, golds and multi-hued combinations. Virgato tones are among the new accent shades.

Be sure to see the new pull-over cut-and-sewn shirts. Long sleeve knits in an astounding range of styles are a leisure-time high spot, too.

WEAR PLAIN-TOE and wing-tip cordovan bluchers for dressy Ivy outfits and select the tapered-toe Italian models for Continentals. Loafers in both varieties are practically a "must" in any teenager's wardrobe. "Dirty bucks," olive suedes and chukkas also get the young vote. Newest kick is wearing yellowish tan "lineman" shoes with wedge rubber soles and bright metal eyelets in place of "heat-up tennis shoes" for knocking around. They look "right" with the ever popular chinos and Bedford cord slacks.
