MRS. SMITH selected a beige chiffon and lace gown with violet accessories, and wore a corsage of brown Cymbidium orchids.

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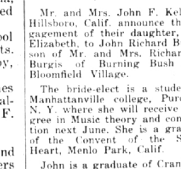
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Sun Valley Summer
